and the other leg is absolutely shattered, the bones being broken into small fragments, and the flesh torn and crushed. He also received a deep scalp wound, where he was struck by a limb.

Immediately following the accident Dr. DeVore of Oakland was called and gave first aid and then brought the men to the local hospital and the case turned over to Dr. Stewart who gave surgical treatment last night.

An effort will be made to save the badly broken and crushed leg, but Dr. Stewart states that it will probably be two weeks before it can be definitely determined whether or not amputation can be prevented.

Both young men are well known in the Satherlin community where they reside. Mr. Bamber's parents moved to Roseburg a short time ago, and are now making their home here.

**WHAT CONGRESS IS DOING TODAY**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The house today approved provisions of the war department bill for maintenance of the regular army at its present strength of 12,000 officers and 119,000 men.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The house rivers and harbors committee today reduced by \$13,214,000 the \$52,000,000 rivers and harbors bill. The committee reduced by \$7,000,000 the \$16,000,000 proposed for the interoceanic canal along the Gulf of Mexico and by \$3,500,000 the \$10,200,000 recommended for the Los Angeles, Cal., breakwater.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The \$289,000,000 annual naval appropriation bill and the \$157,000,000 deficiency measure, the first of the season, were reported today by the senate appropriations committee.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—After examining Secretary Wilbur and other high officials of the navy department, the senate navy appropriation committee concurs in the views of the house committee that the country need not be alarmed about reports that the American navy has fallen below the 5-5-3 ratio.

Adopting a report similar to that of the house committee the senate committee declared today that with the exception of the battleship Florida, laid up for refitting, "no one can say that as to capital ships the 5-5-3 ratio does not prevail."

**TREE HITS AUTO TWO ARE HURT**

**Sutherland Boys Received Crushed and Broken Legs in Accident.**

**ARE IN HOSPITAL**

**George Hinkle and Clinton Bamber Caught Underneath Falling Tree and Badly Crushed.**

George Hinkle and Clinton Bamber, of Sutherlin, were seriously injured, and very narrowly escaped death yesterday evening, when the car in which they were driving on the Galapoola road was struck by a falling tree. Both men are in the hospital, and Bamber may suffer the amputation of one or both of his legs as a result of the accident. Hinkle, although badly cut and bruised, is not as seriously hurt as his companion.

The two young men were traveling along the Sutherlin about ten miles east of Sutherlin when the accident occurred. A V. Absome was cutting a tree near the road, and when the big tree, which measured about 3 feet in diameter at the butt, was being wedged over, it shattered at the base and fell across the Star touring car in which Hinkle and Bamber were riding.

The car was struck by the main trunk of the tree, although near the top, and the force of the impact was such that the car was cut squarely in two. The frame being bent to the ground.

It struck just in front of the windshield and behind the engine, and caught the legs of the two men. The force of the blow was so great that both men were driven entirely through the floor of their car, which was totally wrecked.

Hinkle, who was driving, was protected somewhat by the steering post and so received no broken bones, although he is bruised and cut over his entire body. Bamber however had only the protection afforded by the cowl of the car and is very badly injured.
