**CHIEFS SEND LETTERS**

**New Booklet to Be Published in Near Future to Provide Publicity—Folders to Be Used.**

It was moved, seconded and carried that the secretary attend the annual meeting of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce in Portland this week, and also the mid-winter meeting of the State Secretaries' Association that is to be held in Portland on Friday of this week.  
 The secretary was instructed by the board to make arrangements to have all engravings made for the county booklet while in Portland this week, thus making it absolutely certain that Douglas county will have a booklet in a few weeks that will be a credit to the county. It was moved, seconded and carried that the secretary be empowered to enter into a contract for 400 worth of folders advertising the county until such time as the new county booklets were ready for circulation. The secretary reported a large number of inquiries coming in from the further east states, and that his supply of literature was exhausted.  
 An effort is to be made before next Tuesday afternoon to have all standing committees to have meetings and start the year's work. Much is to be done, and with the organization that Roseburg now has after the last year's work for the most part in investigation and the making of surveys it is certain that Roseburg and Douglas county will be in the reckoning at the end of the year 1925.

which, if we correctly interpret the choice of the people at the recent election, intended that the bonds voted would be used in the construction primarily of a building and not in the investment of realty, especially where the acquiring of property entered too strongly into the investment, for it is a well known fact that there is little salvage from buildings, where they have to be moved or wrecked. Second, we took into consideration the needs of an athletic field, that would care for the needs of our proposed new school for a number of years to come, and third, we considered the advertising benefits to be derived from this proposed investment, as it would interest the tourists and others in passing in and out of our city and surrounding country, and it would seem that we should not overlook this important item in our selection of a site.

"Our committee is not unanimous as to first choice of a site, as two of the committee have indicated that the site known as the Catholic church property and the block immediately north of said property would be our first choice, this property would be described as Lots 3, 4, 5 and 6, in block 26 and lots 1, 2, Land 8 in block 27, and by vacating Washington street between these blocks, we would have a frontage on Kane and Chadwick streets of 383 feet and 224 feet deep, or a much larger space than occupied by the present high school building. The first choice of the other member of our committee is known as the Blakely site, between Jackson and Stephens streets, running back to McMillan street, with a frontage on Mosher street of 200 feet and about 195 feet deep, a beautiful location for such a building as we propose to construct. The last named site would be the second choice of the two members of this committee who favor the Catholic site.

The second choice of the member favoring the Blakely site as the first choice, would be what is known as the old baseball park in South Roseburg, where a number of acres of land can be acquired for an athletic field as well as two solid blocks for building purposes, and possibly at very reasonable prices. This site would include Blocks 19, 20, 22 and 24 of Walter Addition, and the acreage immediately south of said blocks, which would include a part of the Parent property. This location would be such as to be of great advertising advantage, as the tourist travel would get a good view of the buildings and field. This location would be the third choice of two members of the committee.

"The fourth choice of this committee would be the property known as the Sanctuary property located on South Main street, with a number of acres immediately adjoining from the Hamilton estate property, although from an athletic field view point, we doubt if there would be sufficient level land for this purpose. This could only be determined by having a survey made.
