SENATOR SUBSTITUTES THE UNDERWOOD BILL. (Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The senate today voted to substitute the Underwood bill providing private operation at Muscle Shoals, for the Norris government operation bill, but left the measure pending subject to amendment. The vote was 48 to 37 and many of those who voted believed they were disposing of the problem so far as the senate was concerned. After a long parliamentary wrangle President Coolidge ruled the action was merely on substitution for the Norris bill. Following the vote the senate tied itself into a knot over the question of whether it was merely one substitution for the Norris measure or amounted in fact to adoption. It was pointed out that Senator Jones, republican, of Washington, has pending a substitute for both the Underwood and the Norris bills. COURT HEARS ROAD PLEAS December Session of Court Is the Busiest of the Year. CHANGE BOUNDARIES Many Delegations Appear With Requests for Changes in Limits, Appointment of Patrolmen. The county court was today besieged with delegations interested in road matters. The term which started yesterday is the hardest and busiest meeting of the court during the entire year as at this time it is necessary for the court to select the juries for the year, the road patrolmen for the various districts, make changes in road district boundaries, and take up numerous other matters of importance. During today delegations from all parts of the county appeared before the court with matters pertaining to district changes, new boundaries, changes in patrolmen and supervisors and proposed road work. All during the day delegations followed each other in rapid order, presenting their respective propositions, which the county court took under advisement for future action. A large delegation from Edenhower and the territory lying between the city and the country club appeared and asked that the county continue the paving of the road through Edenhower, the particular section now in question lying from the end of the present paving to the top of the hill on the new grade constructed last year. The road has been graded at a great expense, and at the present time the surface is in very poor condition. It is desired to have paving laid to the top of the hill. As the court is interested at this time in boundary changes and the appointment of patrolmen and supervisors, the case was continued over until Saturday, when it will be taken up again by the court.
