DRAGON OF KU KLUX KLAN IS UNDER ARREST

Colorado Man Faces Charge With Judge Lindsey as Complainant.

FORCED A MARRIAGE

Governor-Elect Goes on Bond—High School Boy Makes Charge Against Klansman.

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 9.—Dr. J. Galen Locke, grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, Realm of Colorado, was arrested shortly after noon today on a warrant issued by juvenile Judge Ben B. Lindsey, charging him with conspiracy and kidnaping in connection with the alleged forced marriage of Keith Boehm, 19, to Miss Mae Nash in his office last Tuesday night.

Clarence J. Morley, governor-elect of Colorado, went on Dr. Locke's bond, which was fixed at \$1,000 by Judge Lindsey. Mr. Morley, who also is a Denver district judge was elected to the governorship this fall with the support of the Ku Klux Klan.

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 9.—Formal charges of kidnaping and conspiracy were lodged against Dr. John Locke and others in Judge Ben B. Lindsey's juvenile court today on complaint of Keith Boehm, 19 year old Denver high school youth. The complaint alleges that the men kidnaped him last Tuesday night and took him to the office of Dr. Locke who is grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, Realm of Colorado and there forced him to marry Miss Mae Nash.

Death occurred more than a year after the flight of Koretz from Chicago, which was followed by the disclosure that the Bayano river oil scheme he had promoted for upwards of 15 years was a myth. With him on his flight he took nearly \$2,000,000 in money and securities, upward of \$300,000 of which and jewelry valued at several thousand dollars, he returned a few days later to relatives.
