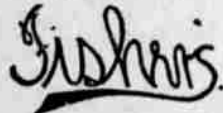

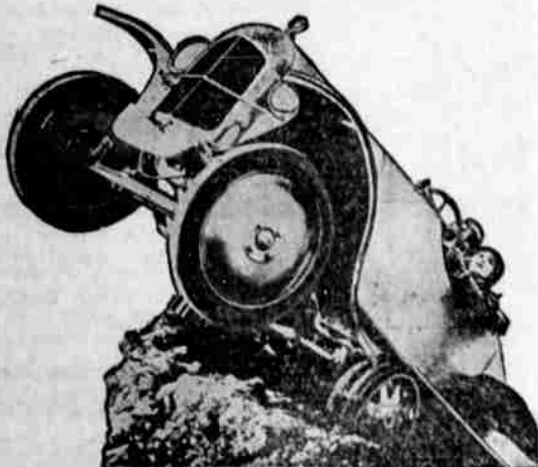

ENGLISH SHIPS BEING CHANGED

LONDON, Jan. 10. — The design of the battleships Nelson and Rodney, now being rebuilt by Great Britain under the provisions of the Washington naval treaty, is so revolutionary according to the Daily Express, that it marks the end of the previous types.

The new ships will be entirely different from any others in the world, the papers say. They will be both floating fortresses and aircraft carriers.

Another feature, the Express is that there probably will be no funnels, the products of the furnace being discharged through pipes running alongside the stern.

The distribution of the armor will also be revolutionary. The magazines, like the guns, being all forward, the usual armor belt extending for three parts of the ship's length will be unnecessary and the weight saved on the sides can be added to the deck protection against high angle fires and aerial bombs.

There will also possibly be more than one armored deck, thus giving successive means of protection.

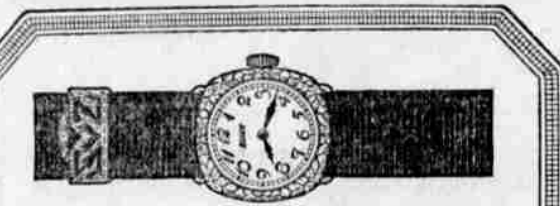
