M'INNIVILLE HAS DESTRUCTIVE FIRE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MCMINNVILLE, Ore., Jan. 15.— Fire of an undetermined origin at 2 o'clock this morning caused a damage estimated at about \$8,500 to the structure known as the Arcade block owned by Kimmell and Engleson at the corner of Third and G streets, near the Southern Pacific depot. It was reported the loss of Kimmell and Engleson was covered by insurance of \$10,000. Ten families occupied the Arcade apartments on the second floor and all were routed without being able to save much of their personal effects. A number of business houses on the main floor suffered. These included: Stage terminal office, loss \$500; insurance not reported; Harry Lowe, restaurant, loss \$100; insurance \$600; A. B. Shepard, Arcade canteen, loss \$500; insurance \$5,000. Olds and Lewis, real estate dealers office, loss \$200; insurance \$400. The building was partially wrecked, and the firemen saved enough of the structure so that the exterior frame work remains standing. The interior is virtually a total loss. Although the firemen had plenty of water at their disposal, they were hampered somewhat by cold weather, there being a heavy frost last night. DEBT SETTLEMENT PLANS DISCUSSED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PARIS, Jan. 15.— An official renewal of the proposal for settling the inter-allied debts contained in the Balfour note of 1922 is made by the British cabinet in the reply Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer has given to the recent letter of Finance Minister Clementel on that subject. The British cabinet thus proposes only the demand from the allies the amount by which Great Britain's payments to the United States for her debt exceeds the amount she receives from Germany. Mr. Churchill's letters says negotiations regarding method of payment will be necessary between the two governments in the same spirit of "comradeship" that united them during the war. (Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 15.— Winston Churchill's accomplishments at Paris in connection with the inter-allied debt question are understood to be of much greater importance than the public is aware. The Chancellor of the Exchequer attended the cabinet meeting today and presented a detailed report of his work at Paris. The British government has no fixed policy regarding the allied

debts, but the cabinet is considering the question of a policy and probably will be able to make a formal announcement shortly, when the attitude of the other allies and that of the United States is more freely known to the government. The British ideas have been several times stated in the Balfour, Curzon and Bonar-Law notes, but these do not agree in all respects and there is a feeling that a permanent English policy should be set forth. The cabinet is expected, however, to adhere to the main point stated in the several notes—that Great Britain is vitally interested only in payments by her debtors of amounts sufficient to balance her debt to America and that it is inconceivable Great Britain will be willing to enter into an agreement to wipe off the debts beyond this amount. BLACKMAILER IS PLACED ON TRIAL

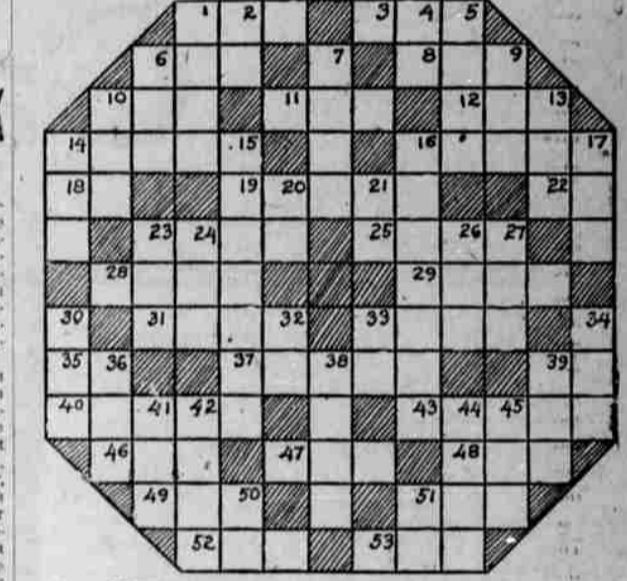

LONDON, Jan. 15.—William Cooper Hobbs, one of the prominent figures in the recent Robinson suit involving the Rajah Sir Hari Singh and a so-called blackmailing plot against the Indian prince, was committed for trial today by a Bow Street magistrate on a charge of "receiving a check for 150,000 pounds sterling stolen abroad," and with being connected with a conspiracy to mulct the Rajah. The defendant, answering the charges denied that he had ever attempted to blackmail the East Indian Prince and declared that the accusations made against him by Montague Noel Newton, who testified in the Robinson case that Hobbs was one of the ring leaders in the blackmailing plot were false. M'CORMICK SUES TO GET OIL STOCK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 15.—Harold F. McCormick, millionaire Chicago farm implement manufacturer, has filed suit in the United States District Court here asking that 123,824 shares of stock in the Standard Oil company of Indiana, valued at more than \$8,000,000 be held in trust for his granddaughter, Anita Ozer. According to Mr. McCormick's suit, his former wife, Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick is attempting to gain possession of the stock, which is a part of a trust created by John D. Rockefeller, Jr. in 1917. McCormick's daughter, Mathilde, married Max Ozer, Swiss riding master shortly after her parents were divorced and Mr. McCormick seeks to hold the stock in trust for their child who is but nine months old.
