SOVIET GLAD TO HEAR HUGHES QUILTS

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

MOSCOW, Jan. 15.—The resignation of Secretary Hughes and the suggestion in some American newspapers that his withdrawal presage a change in the American government's attitude toward Soviet Russia have greatly heartened the Bolshevik officials and newspapers.

The belief is indulged in many quarters that Mr. Hughes' retirement was due directly to disagreement with President Coolidge and his colleagues over the question of recognizing the soviet, and the prediction is freely made that one of the first acts of the new secretary Frank B. Kellogg, will be in the direction of giving official countenance to the soviet regime.

The Bolshevik papers print derisive cartoons of Secretary Hughes, usually referring to him as an uncompromising foe of the soviet.

Izvestia says the United States may be prompted soon to recognize the soviet by the fact that the present Russo-Japanese negotiations looking to recognition are nearing successful termination.

Likewise it suggests that Japan "in the knowledge that the United States may soon recognize Russia" is exerting every effort to bring these discussions to an early successful issue.

FISTIC CALENDAR SAID PROMISING

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The 1925 fistic calendar holds prospects for a more interesting campaign than last year, but, peculiar circumstances surrounding several divisions may again prove a barrier to title activities.

The most attractive outlook for the new year hinges on the probability that Jack Dempsey will risk his title for the first time since his meeting with Luis Angel Firpo in September 1923. The heavyweight champion may take on two opponents, Tommy Gibbons and Harry Wills. Promising material is bristling in most of the other divisions, particularly among the light heavyweight and middleweights. Few champions appear anxious to run undue risks.

Mike McTigue, repeatedly out-pointed by rivals for his world's 175 pound crown in no decision contests clings tenaciously to his laurels.

Gene Tunney, Young Stribling and Paul Herchenbach all appear capable of dethroning McTigue but are unlikely to be given a chance.

Mediumweight champion Harry Greb faces formidable foes in Tiger Flowers, Atlanta negro, and Jack Delaney.

Mickey Walker stands out as one of the few fighting titleholders. Lightweight ranks are suffering from the inactivity of Benny Leonard who apparently has outgrown his division as a result of prolonged idleness. Leonard may prepare himself for a fling at Walker's title.

Kid Kapan, recently crowned featherweight king, promises to keep up active work, and Cannonball Martin, bantamweight champion has several formidable opponents.

Pancho Villa flyweight king, may return from the Philippines to defend his crown against Frankie Genaro, American flyweight champion.
