ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Jan. 15.—Fred H. Bixby of Long Beach, Calif., will be re-elected president of the American National Livestock Association and Phoenix, Arizona, will get the 1926 convention, it was indicated today when the convention convened for the last day of its sessions.
