(Associated Press Local Wire.) WILLIAMS BAY, Wis., Jan. 15.—Sub-zero weather is desired for January 24, when observations and photographs of the eclipse of the sun will be attempted at Iron Mt. Mich., according to Professor Oliver J. Lee of Yerkes observatory here, who is in charge of the arrangements for the work.

The observations and photographs will be made out of doors. "There has been some misapprehension as to how the work is to be done," Professor Lee said. "We are building a shack on Fawcett hill, but will not use it for observation purposes. That work will be done out in the open. The shack will be used for assembling the equipment."

MUSICIANS WANTED FOR U. S. ARMY BAND IN CHINA

The recruiting officer for the Portland, Oregon, recruiting district in the Railway Exchange building, has been recently authorized to make enlistments for the 15th Infantry Band in China. This is considered a very choice assignment for several reasons. In the first place the American forces in China are, in effect, a legion guard stationed at the American barracks in the city of Tientsin. Most of the leading countries of the world keep troops there also, each in their own quarter or section. For instance the French are in the French quarter and the English are in the English quarter and the Japanese in the Japanese quarter, etc. Living conditions in China are very reasonable—much cheaper than in this country, and on top of that one dollar of American money is worth \$1.37 in Chinese money. This price of exchange fluctuates of course.

The pay per month for army musicians ranges from \$21 to \$126 per month during first enlistment, to this must be added the value of rations, clothing, quarters, instruments, light, heat, medical and dental attention, etc., which is estimated to be equivalent to an increase in the monthly payment of from \$50 to \$75, or more.

Men in army bands have no military duties to perform other than that of playing an instrument—straight musical duties which usually consist of about three concerts per week and one dance which the orchestra mostly plays. Of course, they do more or less practice on their instruments, daily.

Men who play the following instruments are wanted: saxophone, clarinet, bass drum, cornet, bassoon, banjo and French horn. It is also desired that several of these men should be able to double on the violin.

Blanche, who in 1889 knocked out Jack Dempsey, the Nonpareil, with the famous pivot punch, and surprised the pugilistic world, has been working here as a tailor for more than a year. It was not learned until recently that he was the fighting name of the eighties who was accorded the honors of a champion.

He is known in Colusa as George Ferguson, his real name. He is 74 now and looks hearty. After his victory over the Nonpareil he joined a party headed by John L. Sullivan and toured Australia. In his late years he reverted to the occupation his father taught him.

FILE NEW CHARGE IN BRIBERY CASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) TOPEKA, Kans., Jan. 15.—Another charge that money was paid for a parole issued by former Governor Jonathan Davis, was added today to the series of accusations against the retired executive, his son, Russell G. Davis, and Carl J. Peterson, state bank commissioner, in connection with alleged trafficking in executive clemency.

The new case presented to the Attorney General and the Blaine county attorney who are investigating the pardon scandals, involves the parole of Ernest Bartholomew, son of C. H. Bartholomew, wealthy Wichita merchant. The elder Bartholomew alleges in an affidavit he had \$1,200 to a man named

"Johnson" and received the parole for his son, who was convicted of automobile theft.

Johnson told him, Bartholomew states, that the deal would be handled through Carl Peterson, state bank commissioner and that the money would be divided \$500 to Governor Davis, \$500 to Peterson, and \$250 to Johnson.
