LAW-MAKERS OF FRANCE WORKING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PARIS, Jan. 16.—The first working day of the Chamber of Deputies in the thirteenth parliament of the third republic proved to be a long one. After the suspension of the sitting during an attempt by deputies of the right and center to rush the communist benches, work was resumed in a somewhat calmer atmosphere and the debate lasted until nearly two o'clock this morning. The debate was taken up entirely with interpellations regarding the strike at Douarnenez, and the attendant communist disorders and was marked by many lively passages, notably between the communist and socialist deputies. Socialist Emile Guieze, acting by a ratification made by the opposition deputy Balaud on his war record, hurled a glass of water at him. Balaud was not hit, but the president's desk was drenched.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The royal and ancient golf club of St. Andrews today announced that its rules of golf committee had decided not to make any reduction in the size or weight of the ball or to change the specifications in any way. The present golf ball weighs 1.65 ounces and measures 1.62 inches in diameter, these specifications being adopted some years ago through agreement between the Royal and Ancient Club and the United States Golf Association. The United States Golf Association favors a ball of 1.55 ounces weight and 1.68 inches diameter.

CHANGES MADE IN INCOME TAX LAW

Reduction of the income tax was effected by the revenue act of 1924. A tax reduction, however, was not the only benefit afforded by this legislation. Increase in the exemption for married persons and heads of families, a 25 per cent reduction on "earned income," and other changes are of immediate interest to every taxpayer.

Returns are required of every single person whose net income for 1924 was \$1,800 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more and of every married person living with husband or wife whose net income was \$2,500 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more. Divorced or married persons separated by mutual consent are classed as single persons. Married persons living together are required to file a return if their aggregate net income was \$2,500 or more or the aggregate gross in-

Her husband and wife living together may include the income of each in a single joint return, or each may file separate returns showing the income of each. Where a joint return is filed, the tax is computed on the aggregate income and all deductions and credits to which either is entitled is taken from such aggregate income. If a wife does not file a separate return or join with her husband in a return, the husband is required to include in his return all income received by the wife in payment of wages, salary, or from the sale of products of her labor. In the returns of married persons must be included also the income of dependent minor children. It should be remembered that a husband and wife living together need make no return unless their aggregate net income for 1924 was \$2,500 or more. Last year returns were required of such married persons whose aggregate net income was \$2,000 or more.

PRISONERS TRY TO MURDER MATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LENOIR, N.C., Jan. 16.—Twenty three prisoners in the principal isolation jail here are on trial charged with attempting the murder of one of their prison mates, who was believed by them to be an active member of the Cheka or secret police organization. The trial which is being conducted in the church of the prison is attracting wide notice, not only because of the unusual nature of the charge, but because the audience is made up entirely of prisoners. The accused men in a body of 300 last October attacked a prison mate named Mark Voron, the man alleged to be the Cheka spy. A furious struggle ensued between the prisoners and the jail wardens, in which five prisoners were shot by military guards. Voron escaped injury.

PROHIBITION ENFORCEMENT BEGAN 5 YEARS AGO

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Federal prohibition enforcement began five years ago today and Commissioner Haynes in an anniversary pronouncement said he believed accomplishments during the period "warrant a fair degree of satisfaction" when "taking all things into consideration." The campaign against illicit liquor has been marked by many advances, but not a retreat he said. Recounting that the principal flow of liquor after January 16, 1920, had been due to diversion from bonded warehouse with-drawals, the commissioner said, this had been reduced to a minimum by use of the permit system. The coast guard in combating liquor smuggling, he said is "fast getting it under control." Less than 10 percent of the entire production of denatured alcohol is now being used illicitly, he estimated.

ATTEMPT MADE TO ROB S. P. STATION

A bold but fruitless attempt to rob the Southern Pacific Station at Oakland occurred late yesterday afternoon. A young man, unmasked, came by a three weeks' growth of black beard, entered the station building and approached the ticket where W. A. Nicholas was on duty. As the clerk approached the ticket window to answer the man's request, he was confronted with a revolver aimed across the counter and into his face, and a gruff command to throw up his hands. Instead of complying with the order Nicholas dropped behind the partition below the window, and out of sight of the would-be-bandit. The latter, realizing that the clerk now had the advantage, became frightened and gave up his plan of robbing the cash drawer of its contents, and ran out of the depot. Mr. Nicholas immediately called the Oakland officers and a search was made taking in all of the surrounding community. Several volunteers aided in the search, but the bandit evidently went into good hiding for he could not be located, and apparently escaped from the vicinity. He was described as being a fairly young man, dressed in a dark suit and wearing a black felt hat. His face bore a heavy growth of beard. He was a man of about medium size.

Mrs. Sara T. Ryan has divorced Allan A. Ryan, spectacular young New York financier, naming a "Mrs. Jane Doe," correct name unknown. News that the divorce had become final recalled Ryan's testimony before the New York County Grand Jury in 1923 that he had identified as his wife's some wearing apparel found in the apartment of George W. Maxwell, president of the Society of American Composers. Maxwell subsequently was indicted by the Grand Jury for an alleged "poison pen" plot in which the Ryans figured, but the indictment later was dismissed for lack of evidence. The Ryans have five children. Germany has "honestly disarmed," and the intention of the Allies to maintain their troops of occupation in Cologne "has stirred the German soul to its innermost depth," Foreign Minister Gustav Stresemann declared, adding: "The action of the Allies means a disaster through the Doves plan, despite warnings that, even after Germany had accepted, Cologne would not be evacuated." Meanwhile, word has come to Marshal Foch, who commanded Allied forces during the World War, that Germany has organized, secretly, an army of 500,000 volunteers and has sufficient arms and munitions hidden with which to fight them. That, under the surface, is said to be the reason for the decision of the Allies not to withdraw troops of occupation from Cologne.
