Search for New Element to Be Made During Test January 24.

TO USE DIRIGIBLE

Helium, Used in Airships, Was Discovered Through Such Tests—Unknown Element Suspected.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—One of the many investigations to be made during the solar eclipse on January 24, will be a search for a new element, Dr. C. C. Kless of the Bureau of Standards who will be one of the observers on the airship Los Angeles...

From the Los Angeles, which will take a position at sea above cloud levels, for the observations, Dr. Kless' camera will seek to photograph spectra of the momentarily extinguished orb, the process involving the filtering of the light through a glass prism...

At the moment of eclipse, the central body of the sun is completely obscured and the only light given out comes from the thin "corona" which is this halo of incandescent gases which spring out from the central body...

THREE HANGED AT FOLSOM FOR MURDER OF MAN

Killed Insurance Broker in Los Angeles in 1923 During Robbery.

MEET DEATH BRAVELY

Three Hanged at Approximately Same Hour—Climax to a Long Series of Crimes.

FOLSOM, Calif., Jan. 16.—John Geregac, one of three men to be executed in California prisons today for the murder of Charles A. Chapman in Los Angeles last year died on the gallows at the state prison here this morning.

The two traps of the gallows were sprung simultaneously. Ferdinand was pronounced dead in 13 minutes, but it took a minute longer for Sears to die.

There were approximately 150 witnesses. Four of the spectators were made ill by the scene and two of them collapsed. The men went to the double trap with a steady tread and seemed to ignore everything about them.

PUBLIC DEBT HAS BEEN INCREASED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The public debt of the United States including that of the federal government and all of its subdivisions multiplied nearly seven times between 1912 and 1922. It was \$25,942,000 while in 1922 it was \$182,155,886,000.

The debt total in 1922 made the per capita obligation of each citizen of the United States, adult or child \$283.79. In 1912 the indebtedness was \$49.97. Apportioning out the debt of per capita indebtedness the report said that in 1922 the federal government obligations were responsible for \$203.78 of the total, the debt of states, for \$5.64 and the debt of the municipal divisions, for \$74.37.

The greatest proportionate debt per capita obligation of each citizen of the United States, adult or child \$283.79. In 1912 the indebtedness was \$49.97. Apportioning out the debt of per capita indebtedness the report said that in 1922 the federal government obligations were responsible for \$203.78 of the total, the debt of states, for \$5.64 and the debt of the municipal divisions, for \$74.37.

BAPTISTS PLAN BUILDING PROGRAM

The Annual Meeting of the Baptist Church held on Wednesday night will prove of far reaching effect for the local church and for the city. Plans were set in motion for the obtaining of an adequate building as a means of the work and worship of the local congregation. Definite plans were made to start a campaign to secure the first unit of an adequate building. This unit will be a Sunday School building sufficient for a school of five hundred. Future needs are being carefully planned for. To secure such a building a campaign will soon be begun for \$25,000 to put into the lot and Sunday School building. The lot has been purchased. It is hoped to have this amount of money in and the building constructed within three years. It is hoped that it will not take this long. The plan for the new Sunday School building was completed by the increasing interest and growth of the Sunday School. This has been a consistent growth over several years. The growth in the last few months has been considerably over one hundred. The present enrollment was reported as 459 with an average attendance over several months of 318. An extra house across the street from the church has been rented for several months, but even that has not given the situation much relief. It is planned that when the Sunday School building is completed that it will be one of the best buildings for such purposes in this part of the state. The reports for all departments of the church were most encouraging. The clerk reported that there were 67 additions to the church last year, 29 of them by baptism. The treasurer reported all bills paid and a balance on hand. A total of about \$5,000 was expended last year for local and beneficent work. One of the most encouraging features of the reports was the great interest the young people have taken in the work the past year. New officers elected this year are: Deacons, John Hatfield, R. L.
