COMMISSION TO ASK AUTHORITY CLOSE SEASONS

Game Commission Wants Legislature to Give Them That Power.

MAKE ANNUAL REPORT Handsomely Lithographed Volume Outlines Wishes of Commission—Want Shorter Season.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—The state game commission will make a fight for an act to authorize the legislature for an act to authorize the commission to use its judgment and discretion in opening and closing game seasons and districts, also for a uniform season throughout the state on all game birds, game animals and game fish; also for a shorter season for hunting deer with the opening date not earlier than September 10.

The commission's efforts to assume this authority, by an interpreting existing legislation, have caused some bitter controversy in the state in the last two years and even got into court where the commission lost out.

The commission's wishes as to legislation were revealed in the biennial report a handsomely lithographed volume of 45 pages, which was received here today.

The commission wants a revolving fund created by the legislature. "The routine work of the committee," says the report, "could be expected should the game commission have an auditor whose duties would be to supervise the purchase of supplies and expenditure of funds; furthermore, should the commission have a revolving fund of sufficient size to take care of regular monthly expenditures all claims could then be assigned to the commission, and the commission thereby enabled to take advantage of cash discounts in purchasing materials. This system prevails in some departments, and should it be made effective in the game department it would greatly expedite its work."

The commission shows a balance in the game protection fund on November 30, 1924, of \$35,964.95. Receipts in 1923 were \$28,677.57 and disbursements \$314,915.58. Receipts in 1924 were \$428,149.46 and disbursements \$357,145.51.

For trout protection \$117,513.57 was expended in 1923 and \$135,367.61 in 1924. Trout distributed to the 36 counties during the two years totalled 68,109,500. Pheasants liberated in several counties totalled 21,822.

Fines resulting from arrests for violation of game laws in 1923 totalled \$22,072.50 and in 1924 \$27,262.
