HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

BEND, Ore., Jan. 19.—Imprisoned in their bed Mr. and Mrs. Fred Nicholas and infant child, miraculously escaped death Sunday when the tent in which they were, was crushed by a falling tree at a logging camp near here. The stove in the tent had no fire burning and it is thought the family would have been burned to death, according to members of the logging crew who effected the rescue after more than a half hour of hard work.

DEATH IS PROBED.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 19.—Examination of the vital organs of Roy Hauschild, was being made today under the direction of the county coroner and county attorney to determine if poison had caused the child's death. The boy died Tuesday, supposedly of pneumonia.

The child was heir to property valued at approximately \$15,000 left in trust for him by his mother, who died in October, 1923.

Since that time the boy's father remarried.
Dr. E. L. Tharlinger, coroner's pathologist said he was ready to sign a death certificate showing the child had died of poisoning.

COURT REPORTER RESIGNS OFFICE

A. C. Ross, who for the past two years has been employed as court reporter in the circuit court, has resigned his position and as soon as some one can be found to take his place, will go to California. He will join his family at Venice, and later will go to San Diego where a position has been offered him starting next July. Mrs. Wayne Jones will probably be appointed to the position of court reporter, although this has not yet been definitely determined.

department over and above expenses would revert to the general fund.
The industrial accident commission, fish commission, game, highway commission, the dental board and many others would be affected.
The measure would have the effect of reducing the tendency of various commissions and boards to waver and expend more money than absolutely necessary. North points out.

STATEHOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—Residents of Umatilla county have wondered whence came the custom among the Umatilla Indians of naming their papooses after famous personages. The source is a member of the state senate. In 1887, Sam Garland, a young Virginian, was sent to Oregon by President Cleveland to be superintendent of schools on the Umatilla reservation. Sam Garland is now senator from Linn county.
"I got along fine with the Indians," he said, although I had never seen an Indian except in a circus until I came to Oregon. But sometimes I had to chant the names of the boys in school. I named one Grover Cleveland, one Bismark, one Gladstone, another Disraeli.

STATEHOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—Legislation to give the state game commission authority to declare closed seasons in times of emergencies will be sought at the present session. Captain A. E. Burduff, state game warden, is working on the measure which will be brought up shortly.
The last session of the legislature endeavored to give such power, but the authority placed in the hands of the commission was nullified by court decision which held that the law was too elastic and not specific.

Captain Burduff pointed out that many times might have been averted had the commission been able to declare a closed deer hunting season last fall. He also pointed out that on account of extreme low water many streams in eastern Oregon should have been closed last summer as a protection and conservation measure.

STATEHOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—Opening the second week of the legislative session the senate this morning held a ten minute session and the house a 15 minute session. Both adjourned until 2 p. m. Several bills were introduced.
All monies collected under the prohibition laws would be thrown to the funds of the various counties under a bill introduced today by Representative North, Multnomah county.

Only the spotlight would be permitted on an auto under house bill 54 introduced today by Shroek Clackamas county. The measure would provide that such light would be fastened on the left side of the machine and directly diagonally across to throw its beam on the right-hand side of the machine.
The law relative to lews on crops for irrigation water furnished would be tightened up by a bill introduced today by Senator Davis.

The bill provides that the person or persons furnishing the water must within forty days after the water is furnished, or within 40 days after the close of the irrigation season, file with the county clerk a claim containing a true statement of the account due after deducting all just credits and offsets, and the date when the water was first supplied, the name of the owner of the crops and the name of the person to whom the water was furnished.
Indigent widows and minor children of soldiers, sailors, marines and volunteers who died in the civil war, the Spanish-American war, the Philippine insurrection and the Indian war would be entitled to all the relief to which the husbands or fathers are now entitled by a bill introduced today by Senators Dennis and Davis.

Salaries of the justices of the Supreme Court would be increased from \$5,250 to \$7,500 by a bill which was introduced today by Senator Staples.
Salaries of District Court judges would be increased from \$5,000 to \$4,000 a year through a proposed bill brought to Salem by Judge Ashby C. Dickson. The measure with several others prepared on behalf of the state bar association, Judge Dickson is chairman of the association's committee to draft these measures.

A bill introduced in the house by Fuller of Polk and Lincoln counties would place salaried peace officers of this state under the operations of the Oregon Workmen's Compensation act.

CASES THROWN OUT.
