Both husbands, who were riding in the front seat of the car, escaped. The women were about 60 years of age.

BOY IS BURNED

"Bill" McElhinny, the two-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McElhinny, was quite severely burned this morning when the contents of a medical lamp were spilled upon his arm. A vapor lamp had been kept burning during the night in the children's room, and this morning while in climbing out of bed he tipped over the lamp, and the medical liquid which it contained in it spilled out, burning his arm from the shoulder to the wrist in a very painful manner.

hide." He promised a full accounting of his \$4,000 secret fund, allowed by appropriation. Governor Olcott, said Pierce, had \$10,000, but used \$23,000 while Governor Withycombe had more than Olcott.

Herwig Got State Money. Pierce was asked if Herwig was a salaried employe of the prohibition department and replied in the negative.

"I don't want to be misunderstood," he said. "You will find two checks made out to Herwig, but these will be explained."

There was some air of mystery about this, for Garland replied, "I don't think it would be for the good of the service for those checks to be discussed publicly."

District Attorney Helgeson of Polk county was questioned at length. He said the district attorneys of the state had made no charges against Cleaver. He declared the reading of the state prohibition law, which he said, divides authority between the prohibition commissioner and the county authorities so that their wires are often crossed.

Cleaver, said Helgeson, interprets the law as placing the burden of co-operation upon the local authorities, that is, requiring local officials to co-operate with the state department, but not the state department with the local officials. Cleaver corroborated this statement. Helgeson defended the reluctance of Cleaver to make known the names of all his operatives. "I wouldn't like to give you the names of all the men I pay in Polk County," he said. "Some of them are moonshiners."

Helgeson said Cleaver should notify the district attorney of any county into which he is sending his men. Governor Pierce asserted that this could not be done in all cases, citing Grant and Klamath counties as instances in which it would be absolutely have tied the hands of law enforcement to do so.

Mr. Cleaver said he had on several times been requested by sheriffs not to notify them for the reason that it would upset their plans completely. If a state agent appeared in the sheriff's office, "The Governor's attitude on this question was discussed by Representative Fitzmaurice."

Lane Solon Has Three Bills. Senator Maglady will introduce three bills today. One would centralize control of all state traffic offices under one chief in the secretary of state's office, remove the function of officers to be employed in that division and leave the secretary of state free to fix the salaries of the men.

Another will provide for compulsory sanitary inspection of public camp grounds, placing them under the supervision of the state board of health and designating county health officers to make regular inspection of the grounds. The service would be supported by fees with an additional compensation allowed to health officers for the inspection work.

The third Maglady measure will ask an appropriation of \$30,000 for an armory at Cottage Grove. This has been approved by Governor Pierce and Adjutant General White.
