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MINISTER LAUDS PRESS FOR AID IN CHURCH WORK

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—Newspapers are showing increased interest in church news and the church should reciprocate by studying the viewpoint of the editor, reporter and press associations, Dr. R. J. Wade, executive secretary, told the world service commission of the Methodist Episcopal church, at its annual session here today.

Total receipts for the seven months for world service, June to December 31, 1924, were \$5,005,587.57, according to the report of Rev. O. W. Auman, D.D., treasurer of the world service commission, meeting here today.

Dr. Auman, formerly district superintendent at Denver, said the money was disbursed as follows: Board of foreign missions, \$1,753,040; board of home missions and church extension, \$1,753,040; board of education, \$1,753,040; board of Sunday schools, \$1,753,040; board of the Epworth League, \$45,500; board of pensions and relief, \$29,884; board of hospitals and homes, \$45,500; general deacon and board, \$23,423; board of temperance, prohibition and public morals, \$65,125; American Bible Society, \$52,982; board of education (commission on course of study), \$15,615; commission of life service, \$19,519.

Amounts paid by various areas included: Denver, \$114,510; Helena, \$57,155; Omaha, \$363,883; Portland, \$105,140; San Francisco, \$290,121 and Washington, \$293,969.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Benny Leonard has retired from the light-weight boxing championship unbeaten. His greatest antagonist of recent years, Lew Tendler of Philadelphia, is returning from Pittsburgh, torn and sore, the victim of a knockout for the first time in his life.

Battered down twice at the hands of the veteran Jack Zivic, Tendler must have undergone a terrible experience in the realization that time had conquered a man who a little more than a year ago fought the great Leonard twice and on each occasion stood firmly on his feet at the end of fifteen rounds.

Leonard and Tendler clashed twice, once in Jersey City and again in New York and both times the champion successfully defended his title.

For the past year and a half Tendler has been doing little fighting. Tendler's defeat at the hands of Zivic undoubtedly precludes any possibility of his entering the tournament for the crown for which, in years past, he strove so valiantly.
