REPORT MADE OF YEAR'S WORK

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Tells of Accomplishments in 1924.

PLANS ARE OUTLINED

Makes Recommendations for Coming Year and States That Prospects Are Good.

Will E. Holbein, secretary of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, today submitted to the board of directors his report covering the activities of the past year. The report deals in a general way with the work that has been done and the prospects for the coming year. His report is as follows: "Gentlemen: "My year's service as secretary of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is drawing to a close, and it is one you gentlemen, who are most vitally interested in the proper functioning of this organization, to give you such observations as may be of benefit to you in making the Chamber of Commerce a powerful instrument in the upbuilding of Roseburg and Douglas county in 1925.

"On February 19, 1924, my secretary submitted a statement of conditions as he found them upon entering upon his duties, and he is glad to say that this year he is able to paint a much more pleasant picture. "At the present writing all other organizations in Roseburg are working in complete harmony with the chamber, and there is no good reason why this condition of affairs should not obtain throughout the coming year.

"During the fall months your secretary listed the accomplishments of the Chamber of Commerce and a careful perusal of this report will show that an earnest effort was made to make the chamber the real power-house of the city. "The questionnaire sent out early last year to all members furnished the necessary data for a program of work, and all suggestions received honest attention and in most cases the board of directors and secretary were able to show concrete results.

"During the year just closed many new settlers were brought to Douglas county, and the chamber cooperated fully in this movement. Our records show over sixty families up to September 1st, as located in the county. We have just received a report from the Southern Pacific agent at Roseburg reporting twenty-three families arriving here in September, and expect to have the report for October, November and December in a few days, which no doubt, will bring the total for last year up to over 100 families located in Douglas county in 1924.

"During the past year, or from March 1st, to December 31st, over forty new members were added to the chamber roll, making a total of 207 members at the close of business December 31st, 1924. There was a balance due on 1924 membership dues of something over \$350, and \$40 due from one of our county chambers of commerce for booth rental at the Home Products Show last September.

"As is usual in all chambers of commerce the world over there has been some criticism of the organization and your secretary. It cannot be expected that all people will think alike at the same time on any given subject, and the man has been born that can please everyone. So the average chamber of commerce secretary expects criticism, however unjust, and does not usually become excited or discouraged when it comes. Furthermore, the secretary being an employe is naturally the target, especially when someone wishes to side-step his duty to his community and the organization. Roseburg is not in a class by itself in this regard, but all secretaries in the state of Oregon and elsewhere have the same spirit to contend with in a more or less degree.

"The past year has been devoted in large measure to becoming acquainted with conditions and men, so that the year 1925 starts us off with a set of committees that cannot be surpassed anywhere. Every committee man was selected with the utmost care for his particular task, and already splendid work has been done by those committees that have organized for the year's work.

"There should be no trouble in raising the budget needed for 1925 if the business and professional

men of Roseburg realize what is before them the coming year, and will not be satisfied to go back to an organization that works along the lines of least resistance. 1925 is going to be the banner year for Roseburg and Douglas county, and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is prepared to do its part.

"MA" FERGUSON INDUCTED INTO GOVERNORSHIP

ers. Perhaps this will not be a bad idea for others to adopt, even though their training and learning may be more than mine. I shall endeavor to make this administration a success by teamwork. There is so much to do that no one mind can bring relief to the people. What Texas needs more than anything else at this time is a strong pull, a steady pull, and a pull all together.

"Progress in matters spiritual as well as material are to be strived for by the first woman governor of the state, she said.

"If the example can be set for a higher standard of morals and purity of life and conduct in public servants of the people, I shall feel my administration has not been in vain. Mrs. Ferguson continued.

"The woman governor declared that many women will be invited to take an active part in the administration.

To Mrs. Ferguson, her inauguration represents the final stepping stone of her determination to clear the family name from the stigma of her husband's impeachment. After his removal from office, she urged him in his efforts at a political comeback.

He tried to regain the governorship, but was overwhelmingly defeated. In 1920 he aimed higher and sought the presidency of the United States, running on the American party ticket. Two years later he ran for the United States senate and made a good race in the first democratic primary, only to lose in the run-off with Earle B. Mayfield. Early last year he again announced his candidacy for governor, but his impeachment barred him from ever holding office in the state, the courts held.

He had his wife make the race. She weathered two heated primaries and then defeated her republican opponent although she ran far behind the rest of the democratic ticket. She made her opposition to the Ku Klux Klan the principal plank of her platform.

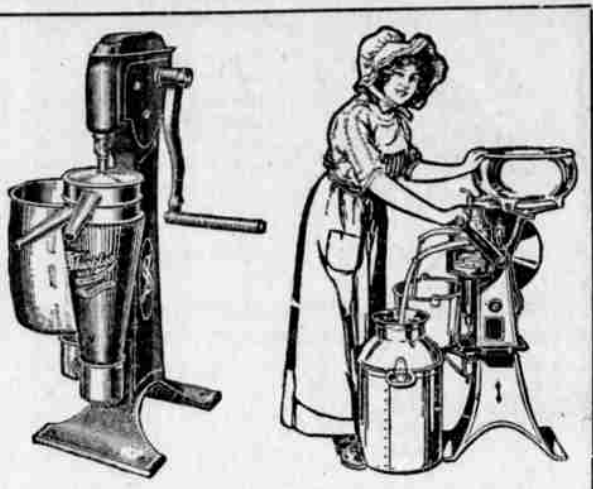
