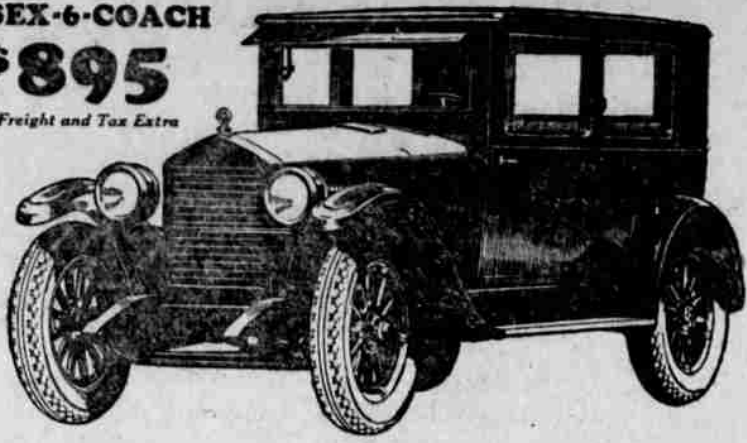

BIG SHORTAGE IN COUNTRY'S WOOL OUTPUT

Growers Association Head Says Nation's Need Is Two-Thirds Met.

URGES MORE SHEEP RANGES Can Feed Fifteen Million Additional Head—Tariff Is Requirement.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21.—There is a decided shortage of wool in the United States, due to increasing population despite the fact that an over production of lambs is sometimes apparent.

President Frank J. Hagenbarth, of Spencer, Idaho, president of the National Wool Growers' Association, said today in his annual address at the opening session of the 60th annual convention of the association.

"There is room for an expansion of 14,000,000 or 15,000,000 sheep on our ranges and farms and there is ample consumptive demand for increase of over 100,000 pounds of wool suitable for clothing purposes. We are today only producing about two thirds of the wool requirements of the United States. This does not include carpet wool consumption."

"There is likewise a world sheep and wool shortage. The sheep shortage has been estimated variously from 70,000,000 to 80,000,000. Although the consumptive and purchasing power of Europe has lessened, new avenues of use have been developed. Japan and China are using fine merino wools to such an extent that Japan alone is consuming over 100,000,000 pounds more of these wools than during pre-war days. The coastal regions of New Zealand, Australia and the Argentine are steadily declining in wool production and increasing in cattle, both for beef and dairy."

"In the United States range sheep production in the future will increase in Colorado, Wyoming, Washington and Montana and there will be a general increase in western farms as well as in the fleece producing sections of the east. In seven or eight years, the sheep census in the United States under a suitable and continuous tariff policy will increase to 59,000,000 head, which will produce 600,000,000 pounds of wool."

"We have attempted in the past to educate the public to a greater use of lamb in the daily diet. However financial support for this work has not been forthcoming. In certain cities in the United States, such as in Iowa and Minnesota, we have had a little cost increased the consumption of lamb from 200 to 600 percent."

Argues For Tariff
Discussing the tariff provisions relating to wool Mr. Hagenbarth said:

"The production of sheep and the growing of wool in the United States is an economic necessity, but unfortunately, owing to the American standard of living and American scale of wages, wool cannot for some years to come at least be successfully produced in this country on a comparative basis with foreign wool. We have neither the natural advantages, the cheap labor, the fostering government nor certain other advantages, climatic and otherwise, which the foreign enjoy at the present time. If we are to produce sheep and wool in this country a protective tariff is necessary."

"There has grown up a tendency especially during and since the war, toward bureaucratic power and government in the United States. The federal government has injected itself into the private affairs of the states and of individuals to an extent which is rapidly approaching the condition which exists in Russia, Bureau's and bureaucrats have received or have taken to themselves confiscatory powers over the property of individuals and of states, which, to say the least, constitute a great danger. Therefore, we are inclined to question the wisdom of conferring upon a tariff commission, or any other commission, other than congress, the power to arbitrarily dispose of the property rights and operations of individuals. Even congress is limited in this respect by the constitution."

In line with this argument, Mr. Hagenbarth proposed that the tariff commission should be a fact finding body only, and that it should have no part in tariff construction otherwise.

BIG TIMBER WOLF CAUGHT IN TRAP

C. M. Holcomb, who lives above Hoaglin, has at last succeeded in trapping a big timber wolf, which for many years has eluded hunters and trappers in the Diamond Lake district. The big wolf was too clever for trail traps and other devices, and has for a number of years killed deer and game animals. Mr. Holcomb finally laid a trap in the wolf's regular trail, and succeeded in catching it. The hide has been sent to the state game commission.

Civic Organization Planned by Younger Element of the City.

TO LIMIT MEMBERSHIP

Would Include Only Men Between Ages of 20 and 30 Not Affiliated With Other Bodies.

Steps are being taken to form a club of young business men in this city, and it is proposed to hold a meeting early next week for the purpose of forming a temporary organization, which will take charge of the preparing of the constitution and by-laws, and will arrange the necessary details incident to perfecting the organization.

ENDORSEMENT GIVEN MEASURE

Chamber of Commerce Favors Bill to Provide for Advertising.

\$50,000 REQUESTED

Money Would Be Turned Over to Chamber of Commerce to Use to Attract Settlers.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce at a meeting of the directors yesterday afternoon, unanimously endorsed the bill now before the legislature proposing an appropriation of \$50,000 to be used in advertising Oregon. The resolution adopted by the organization is as follows:

Whereas, The securing of actual settlers and industries for the state of Oregon is the key to the future prosperity of our great commonwealth, and

Whereas, The Oregon state chamber of commerce is the one organization in the state that has behind it the united effort and thought of every progressive community in our state, and during the past year or two has devoted most of its energies to advertising the state's great natural resources, and

Whereas, There seems to be a disposition on the part of some of the other organizations in the state to assume a passive attitude in the matter of advertising the state and following up various development projects, and

Whereas, There is being introduced in the present session of our legislature a bill carrying an appropriation of \$50,000 annually for a period of two years to be expended through the Oregon state chamber of commerce and the state board of control, and

Whereas, The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is a member of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, and believes that said Oregon State Chamber of Commerce on account of its state-wide organization is the one organization representing all sections of the state, and the one best fitted to conduct such public campaign, therefore be it

Resolved, By the board of directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce that we hereby urge our state senator and representatives in the legislature to support the bill entitled, "An act appropriating money for the purpose of promoting the industrial and agricultural development of the state of Oregon to the end that additional settlers and capital may be attracted into the state, and providing for the manner of expending said appropriation." Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Senator B. L. Eddy, and Representatives R. A. 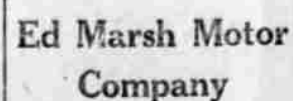
