WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Without discussion and on a record vote the senate today accepted an amendment to the naval bill requesting President Coolidge to call another arms conference.

Senator Banks' bill providing for an appeal to the Circuit Court from orders of Municipal officers revoking licenses of soft drink establishments, card rooms, hotels, etc., was in process of a tropical debate by the senate today, when adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock.

VICTIM OF NEAR HANGING TELLS STORY IN COURT

VALE, Ore., Jan. 21.—That he was strung up on the limb of a tree three times before he would confess that he had supplied the district attorney with information concerning bootlegging activities was declared on the witness stand here today by Ralph Harvey in the trial of Bert and Stella Lawrence.

The state introduced photographs of Harvey's neck showing the rope burns and the limb of the tree with the bark cut by the rope. Other witnesses on the case corroborated minor points in Harvey's testimony.

The defense presented its side of the affair with its first witness, Mrs. Bert Lawrence, the wife of one of the defendants. She testified that Ralph Harvey had continually bothered her with his attentions, and detailed several times when she thought she had advanced toward her, but steadfastly maintained that she had not at any time given him any encouragement.

She said she had related these incidents to her husband, and that he said he would stop Harvey and make him let her alone.
