ZONE MEETING AT CANYONVILLE

Zone No. 1 held its second meeting at Canyonville, Saturday, January 17, with our new County superintendent, Mrs. L. Ackert in charge. Although small in number the group of teachers gathered for the meeting enjoyed a most beneficial and enjoyable session. The meeting opened with President Beethers of Canyonville in charge.

Roll call of teachers was instructively entertaining by responses which answered a question on Oregon history. Plans for extensive work in Oregon history as well as in the study of Oregon school law were briefly outlined by Supt. Ackert, to be taken up at the next meeting. Outstanding features of the discussion were that the fundamental feature of the work should be to teach the principles of arithmetic, stressing principles involved in solution rather than mere solution of individual examples, then drill on principles, supplementing text list of examples when necessary to give pupils more drill on application of principles.

In the afternoon Prof. Carlton of the University, gave a most inspiring address on "What Shall I Read in 1925?" He took up the value of cultivating a taste for the best in literature and reading the worth while works of modern authors, advocating a choice of one great writer to read, study, and know well rather than reading at random from a variety of authors. An outlined list of reading for the year included such study, taking the well known writer of romantic realism, Conrad.

He also stressed the value of reading in the classics at least once a year, outstanding of these to be from the New Testament writers, particularly the "Sermon on the Mount." From these writers is gained a deep philosophy, understanding of nature and beauty of diction found in no other writing.

At noon a delicious dinner was served at the school house by the girls of the Canyonville high school. Music for the afternoon was provided by the high school and local talent as follows: Piano Duet, Etie and Echo Parley; vocal solos by Mrs. Manley and Mrs. Porter.

The work as outlined by Supt. Ackert promises to be most interesting and helpful to the teachers who are all enthusiastic in their support of our new superintendent and eager for the work to be taken up at the next meeting which will be held at Glendale sometime in the spring.

DICK SMITH MAY BE NEXT FOOTBALL COACH AT U. OF O.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 21.—Recommendation of Dick Smith for the position of football coach at the University of Oregon was made by the Oregon Alumni Association at a meeting here last night.

A Yeggs Kest, director of athletics at the University of Oregon, met with the alumni and explained why he and other officials at Oregon favored Smith.

There seemed to be some opposition from several of the younger members of the alumni, who were of the opinion that Smith, because for sometime, might not be competent to the present day style of football. They would have preferred a man like "Slip" Madigan, the St. Mary's coach.

Other members of the alumni were of a different opinion, however, and there was considerable discussion. Earl assured those present that Smith, who is a successful lawyer in Eugene, would gladly step aside at any time that a man fitted in every way to act as coach should be found.
