serve would be to protect deer, according to Kirkwood, chairman of the game commission. The house game committee introduced a joint memorial yesterday evening, asking congress not to effect any legislation which would place Diamond Lake in Crater Lake reserve. The memorial points out that Oregon has stocked with fish the lake and that its free use to fishermen and other pleasure seekers should not be impeded.

Farmers Appeal for Aid.
Senator Taylor today received a letter and a resolution from the wheat growers of Morrow county asking legislative aid for the grain men there, where, it is claimed from fifty to seventy five per cent of the winter wheat will have to be reseeded because of damage caused by cold weather. The Morrow county farmers met at Lexington Monday and made an estimate of their damage and at that time decided to ask the legislature for help. Unless the land is reseeded, it is claimed, bankruptcy will result for a large number of farmers and banks.

Game Law Changes Asked.
Women would be compelled to obtain hunting and fishing licenses as well as men under an amendment to the state game code proposed today by the house game committee. The committee also suggested that disabled soldiers, sailors and marines be permitted to hunt and fish without licenses.

A board of regents for the state school for the deaf and the state school for the blind, would be created by a bill introduced by Senator Corbett today. The board would be composed of seven members. These would be the state superintendent of schools, the dean of the school of vocational education of Oregon Agricultural college, the president of Oregon normal school and three citizens of the state at large, two of whom would be women.

Application for authority to appropriate underground waters could be made with and passed on by the state engineering department in the same manner as surface waters are now administered, under a bill introduced in the senate today by Davis.

Fisher's Stock Bill Passes.
The house passed a bill this morning providing for a change in the code covering wills and would make all wills void in cases of marriages.

House Bill No. 53 introduced by Fisher, Douglas county, passed. It provides that certain stock may run at large in sections of Douglas county not permitted under the present law. **Irrigation Law Changes Asked.**
In a report submitted to the irrigation committees of the two houses of the legislature, Jefferson Meyers and Harold Baldwin, majority members of a special committee appointed by Governor Pfitze to make a survey of the irrigation situation in the state, recommend the repeal of the constitutional provision authorizing the state to certify to and pay the interest on irrigation bonds. W. D. B. Dodson, the third member of the committee, in a dissenting report, opposes the repeal on the general ground that it would have the effect of proclaiming to the world that irrigation in Oregon had been a failure and would be without any beneficial results.

The majority members also recommend that reclamation districts now indebted to the state or interest paid or on bonds be required to remit.

Six other recommendations are made by the committee. First — That the office of the state director of land reclamation be created, and that he be given supervision over all irrigation projects now constructed and to be constructed in the future.

Second — That in the future when a project is launched a detailed forty-acre study be made of the lands by the district in conjunction with the state director of land reclamation.

Third — That the director of land reclamation and other state

officials having charge of reclamation be empowered to require that a minimum of 50 percent of the lands in a project launched be listed for sale at a fair and reasonable figure.

Fourth — That hereafter in fixing the cost of construction of an irrigation project that there be included in it an establishment for drainage and that the authority be vested in the district to construct a drainage system if necessary.

Fifth — That the boards of reclamation districts be required to adopt a standard system for keeping accounts.

Sixth — That where districts in the given state did in the past fail to meet their obligations to the

state machinery be provided for their reorganization on a sound basis.

Senators and representatives of the arid sections of the state are preparing to oppose the recommendation that the constitutional amendment authorizing the state to pay the interest on irrigation bonds be repealed.

None of the other recommendations are expected to precipitate anything in the way of a clash.

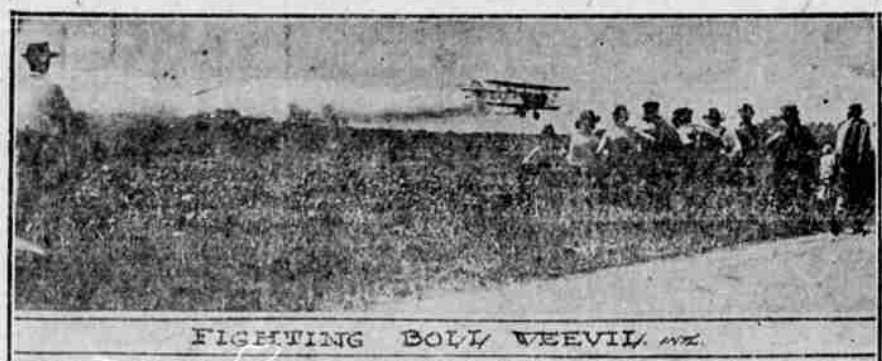
Revised Banking Code.

The revised banking code, prepared by the legislative committee of the State Bankers' Association, will be introduced in the senate today. It gives greater power to the state superintendent of banks.

The minimum capital stock allowed would be \$25,000 in towns with population of 3,000 or less. At present this minimum is \$15,000 for towns with population from 3,000 to 25,000 a capital of \$50,000 would be required. For cities with population from 25,000 to 50,000 a capital stock of not less than \$100,000 would be required, and for those of more than 50,000 the capital stock must be at least \$200,000.

Greater protection to depositors, particularly savings depositors, is afforded by a requirement that capital shall be segregated between the commercial and the savings departments.

work, does not feel that it is a fair proposition to have the state prohibition agent get credit for the work done by the county officers.

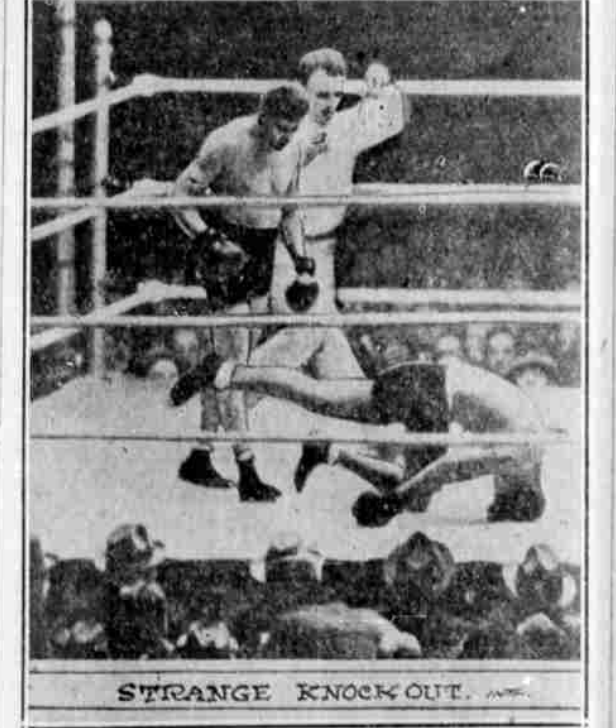
