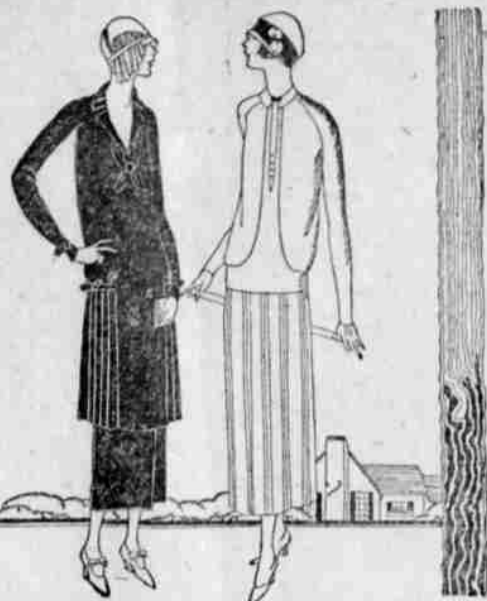

would be organized and financed by an advance of \$6,000,000 from the war finance corporation, to be reimbursed by commission charges for handling excess farm commodities. The purpose of the bill would be to divert surplus American farm products into the foreign trade at profitable prices.

The emergency in agriculture has not passed, it was declared, and unless some aid was given, more farmers will be driven to the cities to the detriment of agriculture, industry and the country generally.

All of the farm spokesmen agreed that the farmers' difficulty was due to an economic situation "compelling the farmer to buy in a highly protected market and sell in a low world market." They declared the best way to solve the problem was to bring agriculture "into the protected circle with industry and labor," and then gradually lower production.

RIDDLE ASKS INVESTIGATION HOME BUDGET

made in the wages of the cooks, waitresses and other employees. He submitted a budget, but when it became evident that he was to be removed, the list of proposed expenditures was returned and he made other slashes.

The proposed budget contains a cut in the physicians salary from \$75 to \$65; the two cooks were cut from \$75 to \$60 per month. The item of \$50 per month for a truck driver was eliminated, the clothing allowance was cut \$2,000, an item of \$1,700 for improvements in the canteen, was eliminated, and \$1,000 was subtracted from the \$1,500 allowance for transportation, which covered the operation of the auto truck, and the personal railroad fares of the officers in attending meetings of the board of control.

"The claim of economy is deliberately false," Commandant Riddle stated. "In the first place Mr. Henderson claimed a saving of more than his own salary, when in fact his reduction was only \$100 and that was made at the expense of the efficient hired help, which has always received less pay than in any other state institution.

In September 1923 my expense account in conducting the home was \$1,622 and in the same month in 1924 was \$1,842.29. In October 1923 mine was \$1,613.71, and in October 1924 was \$1,772.72. Mine in November 1923 was \$1,287.72 and in 1924 was \$1,674.12. In December, when it became evident that a change was to be made, he made his showing of economy by promiscuously cutting the wages of those employed in the institution. My expense for December 1923 was \$1,646.92 and his in 1924 was \$1,772.72.

"The institution cannot be efficiently conducted under the budget which he has submitted. He eliminated the use of the auto truck which we used to haul freight and supplies, and substituted the old team and wagon, a slower method of conveyance and a step backward instead of forward in efficiency.

"He also eliminated \$2,000 from the clothing allowance, a cruel slap at the veterans of the Civil war, for they are the only ones affected. Nearly all of the veterans are sending money home. Only two or three are able to save anything, and they feel that it is discrimination to make them pay for their clothes when the others are not required to do so.

"The only saving which he made at the expense of the men and women who are aiding in operating the institution. These people are efficient workers and are paid less than in any other state institution, and it is not efficiency to lower their wages.
