PRISONER HELD CRAZY 'LEGALLY' NOT 'MENTALLY'

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—Writ of Habeas Corpus has been granted in circuit court here by Judge H. L. Nicholson on petition of Tom Garland, Portland attorney, requiring Oregon State Hospital officials to show cause on February 5, why they should not release Harold La France from the insane asylum. Garland charges that La France is not insane and is being held illegally. La France was received here January 17, from Multnomah county and Dr. John Evans, assistant physician, at the hospital, states that on his first examination of La France he found no trace of insanity, but refused to make any conclusive findings until he has had ample time for observation.
La France, who is 29 years old, is the son of James L. France, now serving time at McNeil Island Federal prison, and has served two terms in the Oregon penitentiary.
Young La France was arrested with a companion in Portland on a charge of robbing a Portland garage man, but was found insane and sent to the asylum.
In his petition for a writ of Habeas Corpus for La France, Garland asserts that La France is not now insane and never has been mentally insane only legally insane, and that for a short time.

INTIMATIONS OF 'SEEN' JUROR IN JERSEY RUM CASE

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 23.—Further consideration to charges made by Everett M. MacLennan, a member of the jury that disagreed yesterday in the case of 12 men tried here in the alleged Weehawken liquor conspiracy, that one member of the jury had entered the box determined to acquit was expected to be given by the prosecuting attorney's office today. Although the prosecutor's office had not yet decided upon a definite course to be followed in regard to the charges made against United States Senator Edward J. Bowassa during the trial by two government witnesses, it was said that their testimony would be presented to the grand jury next week.
Samuel Wilson, assistant superintendent of the New Jersey anti-saloon league, in a statement today declared it would be a joke to hold a new trial here.
