CONFERENCE ON OPIUM ENDS IN A FLAT FAILURE

American and British Representatives Cannot Reach Agreement.

SOME HOPE HELD OUT

Non-Official Standing of Delegates Barrier in Proceedings—New Meet Urged.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) GENEVA, Jan. 22.—A private meeting today between Representative Stephen G. Porter of the United States and Viscount Cecil of Great Britain in an attempt to save the opium conference from a breakdown resulted in failure.

Mr. Porter stated that unless conditions changed radically he would return to the United States within a few days.

Previously under the chairmanship of Dr. Zahle of Denmark, the representatives of the countries having far eastern possessions, where the opium smoking practice prevails, held a private meeting to frame the text of a resolution setting up a joint commission and to examine generally as to means for saving the conference from breakdown.

The joint commission idea was evolved as a possible means of getting around the difficulty caused by the fact that the British and other delegations maintain their entire within the province of the first conference, immediately preceding the present one and that the latter conference is of competent officials to take up the problem of opium smoking, as insisted by Mr. Porter.

League of Nations officials said today that as a result of the far eastern conferences with leaders like Lord Cecil, Dr. Zahle and M. Daladier of France, an adjournment would probably be favored by the league authorities provided they became convinced no agreement now was possible.

Some of the smaller states seem anxious to adopt the adjournment alternative as a means of preserving the prestige of the League of Nations under whose auspices the conferences have been held.

A group of representatives of such states, headed by Michael Maswhite of the Irish free state, called on Mr. Porter last night and urged him to favor a long adjournment if a second seemed impossible at this time.

Mr. Porter told Lord Cecil that the plan for appointing a joint commission from the present and earlier conferences to discuss the problem of opium smoking proposed by some of the delegates as a means of saving the conference was not acceptable to the Americans. Mr. Porter considers this plan unsatisfactory and useless on the ground that the members of the commission representing the present conference would have no official standing owing to the contention on the part of many of the countries that the present conference has no competency to discuss opium smoking.

Mr. Porter expressed the opinion that the best procedure would be to convene a new conference with opium smoking clearly on the agenda.

Lord Cecil told Mr. Porter he had not looked favorably on the proposal of some of the smaller states to adjourn the conference for about a year, but said his decision on this point was not final. He asked the American representative to remain and complete the narcotic drug convention, leaving the question of opium smoking for further treatment in the future.

Mr. Porter declined this proposition because he believed the two problems were inseparable.

Other efforts to save the conference continued today. A delegation to the Americans, the powers having opium smoking colonies in the far east have made no new concessions but are standing by their demands that the suppression of smoking within a specified period be conditional upon the reduction of opium production in China, which condition is unacceptable to the Americans.

Christian Chinese Beheaded For Refusal to Grow Opium.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 22.—A prominent missionary today informed a Renter's correspondent that the military authorities in the province of Fukien had beheaded 300 Christian Chinese farmers because they refused to grow opium.

The missionary added that although the Chinese officials were compelling the farmers to cultivate opium, 1500 Christian families had refused to obey orders and that the executions followed.

NEW PLANS FOR PEST CONTROL IN THE COUNTY

New Form of Poison Gas to Be Experimented With During Summer.

H A S ADVANTAGES

Does Away With Many of the Objections to Poisoned Bait—Biological Survey Worker Is Here.

A. W. Moore of the U. S. Biological Survey, who has for three years been interested and active in the rodent control work in Douglas County, and J. E. Garrison of the American Cyanamid Company, are spending a few days in Roseburg, starting the preliminary work on the squirrel eradication program for this year.

Douglas county has been making great strides in this work in the past few years, and is one of the leading countries in this project. Mr. Moore and Mr. Garrison are introducing a new system, which will be utilized in addition to the poisoned grain, and it is expected that good results will be obtained.

Many farmers do not like to use poisoned bait because of the fact that turkeys or stock eat the grain, and hogs often pick up the poisoned carcasses. For that reason some difficulty is encountered in securing cooperation from all farmers.

A new system of disposing of the rodents is now being worked out. The material used is flake calcium cyanide, a substance which forms a poisonous gas when it comes in contact with atmospheric moisture.

A spoonful of the poison is placed in the mouth of the burrow and as it is touched by the moisture in the air, gives off a poisonous gas which fills the hole. The gas differs from other forms of gas used in that it is not suffocating, but is potent. With the others if the squirrel reaches the air after being subjected to the gas, he will recover but one whiff of the calcium cyanide is said to be sufficient to end his life. The gas, however, does not poison the carcass, and will do no injury to a dog, hog, or other animal, which might eat it. This method, it is said, has been tried out with great success in several localities in the northwest during the past year, and it is proposed to make an exhaustive test in Douglas County during the summer months.

Four communities have already announced extensive rodent control campaigns, and they will probably take up the new system together with the poison grain as formerly used. The calcium cyanide will be distributed through the same agencies as the poisoned grain, and will be handled at cost.

It is expected to start the campaign about the first of March, and it is planned to bring in about 1,000 pounds of the gas producing material for first experiments.

YELLOW PERIL AGAIN.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—Conversation over a telephone frequently may sound like Chinese to the harassed listener at either end, but it should not be paid for in Oriental currency, police told three men whom they arrested in a pay station here yesterday in the alleged act of settling for a long distance call to Dallas, Tex., by feeding a stream of Chinese coins into the slot reserved for quarters.
