John Gill of Lebanon, representing Linn county sportsmen; W. W. McNealy of Klamath Falls; W. L. Crowe, of the Portland Gun Club; W. R. Wallace of Eugene, and Ben Dorris of the game commission. Mining Bureau Change Asked. The southwestern Oregon mining bureau has asked Senator Miller to introduce a bill in the legislature for the repeal of the act creating the old state mining bureau and the commission at the head of it, and to turn all of its records and property over to the school of mines at the Oregon Agricultural College. He also has been asked to introduce a measure that will authorize the school of mines through a field or extension service, to provide for cooperation between the school of mines at O. A. C. and the mineral industry of the state similar to that which exists between the agricultural school at the college and the farmers.

The purpose of field representatives of the school of mines would be to make an economical mineral survey with the consequent tabulation of such data as would be helpful in the development of the mineral resources of the state.

## AMERICAN WOOL PRICES DUE FOR ADVANCE SHORTLY

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 23.—The possibility of wool manufacturing on the Pacific Coast on an extensive scale was to be considered today by delegates to the National Wool Growers Association now holding its sixtieth annual convention here. The sessions will close tonight with the election of officers.

Frank J. Hagenbarth of Spencer, Idaho, who has served as president for the past 12 years, was slated for re-election.

BOSTON, Jan. 23.—The commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: The wool markets of the world are in a somewhat hesitant frame of mind at the moment, the latest time for which many have looked forward, having arrived. It remains to be seen whether the strong statistical position of wool or the resistance of buyers, due to the present high price level, will prevail.

The foreign markets are fairly strong as regards crossbred but somewhat vacillating on Merinos. The London sales are dragging along in a very dull manner with heavy withdrawals of speculators' wools. London still, however, is slightly the dearest market in the world.

Initial showings of heavy weight goods by the American Woolen company are expected either February 8 or 9, with prices likely to show a five to ten per cent advance over six months ago on the present cost of labor and raw materials.
