BODY OF CRIME VICTIM IS SAVED FROM BURNING

Neighbors' Discovery Leads to Companions Arrest—Robbery Motive.

NO MONEY OBTAINED

Shotgun on Prisoner Same Type as Weapon Used by Pacific Beach Murderer.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 23.—With a gaping hole in his neck and his chest riddled with shotgun bullets, the body of George Pettit, 55, a carpenter, was found beneath three gasoline soaked blankets in the house which Pettit had occupied with James A. Tungate, 26, at Pacific Beach, near here, last night.

Tungate, who recently came here from Kentucky, was arrested in San Diego shortly after the body was found and was this morning held at the city jail for further examination. Neighbors were attracted to the house in which Pettit's body was found by smoke pouring from the windows. The blankets under which the body was concealed had not been burned, however, the flames being extinguished by neighbors before gaining much headway on furniture which had evidently been used to start the conflagration.

A bank book found on Pettit's body by police, recorded a deposit of \$800 made yesterday. Police are inclined to the theory that Pettit's murderer believed him still to have this money in his personal possession. Tungate was arrested while entering San Diego from Pacific Beach in his automobile, in which was found a shotgun, with a quantity of ammunition. One exploded shell was found on the floor of the machine. Tungate explained to the police that he had been duck hunting during the afternoon and that on returning home he had found the body of Pettit. At the time of his arrest, police stated, he claimed to have been enroute to National City near here, with the intention of notifying Pettit's daughter, residing there, of the death of her father.
