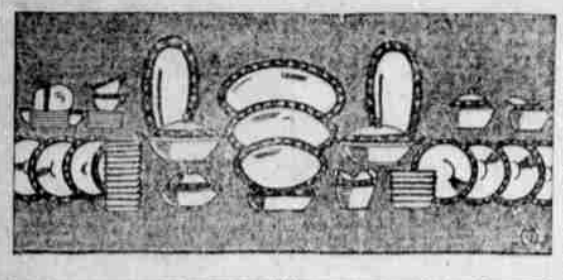

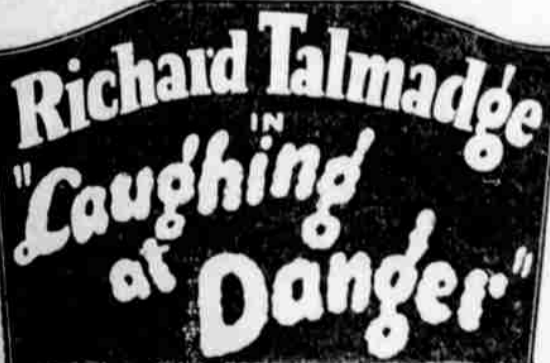

## LOUIS E. BEAN MAY GET OFFICE U. S. ATTORNEY

According to a story which appeared in yesterday's Oregon Journal, a movement is on foot at the state legislature to secure endorsement for some other candidate for the office of U. S. district attorney for Oregon besides George Neuner and Robert Kuykendall. The Journal story reads as follows:

Journal Bureau, Salem, Jan. 23.—Federal politics and federal patronage entered the halls of the state legislature today when a petition appeared in the senate, which is being numerously signed, recommending to Senator McNary and Stanfield, the selection of Louis E. Bean of Lane county as a compromise candidate for the appointment as United States attorney for Oregon. The petition also is to be circulated in the house, and when all available signatures by senators and representatives have been obtained, will be sent on to the senatorial delegation in Washington.

It might be explained, in connection with the incident, that Bean, although he has been at Salem the last day or so, was not the sponsor for the petition, but that it was started in his behalf by his old friends and legislative colleagues. From what may be gathered here, there is a definite deadlock between McNary and Stanfield over the selection of a successor to Judge Coke as existed on the day of Coke's resignation months ago. McNary and Stanfield, it is understood, proceeding on a program of elimination at their first conference over the district attorneyship, agreed to set aside both George Neuner and Robert Kuykendall from further consideration. Following that agreement the senators took up for discussion various other possible appointments, among them that of Bean. It developed, it is understood that McNary was opposed to Bean because of past political activities just as he was opposed to Kuykendall because of his recent political activity as a candidate for attorney general against Van Winkle.

As time passed and the deadlock continued unbroken, the story came back that McNary has been bringing Neuner back into the discussion as a possible appointee, although the one chief "dark horse" suggestion as a compromise made by McNary to Stanfield was Charles Harby of Eugene.

In the still darker background, however, is the candidacy of Tom T. Bennett of Marshfield, against whose appointment neither of the senators seem to have marked opposition.

The Oregonian states that the appointment has been held up because of the absence of Senator Stanfield, who has been away from Washington for the last two weeks. He is expected to return at any time, however, and the matter of the appointment will be immediately taken up at that time.

### ECLIPSE IS VIEWED WITH INTEREST

appearance of awe inspiring coronas.

It seemed like many minutes rather than a few seconds that darkness saturated earth and sky, except for that small portion where hung the dazzling circle of colorful fire.

Then slowly the shadow bands appeared on the opposite side of the solar lunar conjunction. Bally heads spread their olive crowns again—a feature of the spectacular eclipse about which the forecasts of astronomers had said little.

By this time the corona had subsided, chased into invisibility by the regaling splendor of the sun. A few minutes more and the spectacle turned in the final stages, looking much as it did in the initial phase only in the reverse, like a quarter moon of supernatural brilliance gradually evolving to a full moon proportions. Twilight slowly became daylight again.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—President and Mrs. Coolidge with pieces of ordinary smoke-studded window glass as their only scientific apparatus, today viewed the eclipse of the sun from the south lawn of the White House. The chief executive and his wife appeared on the lawn at 8:40 o'clock, the president carrying a window pane with a big smoked spot in the center. Mrs. Cool-

Mr. Coolidge went to his office before the eclipse reached its maximum and started to work evidently satisfied with his view of the preliminary part of the spectacle.

BRONX, N. Y., Jan. 24.—The two ring celestial circus, a total eclipse of the sun, was successfully performed in all its brilliant glory at 2:11 a. m. today, precisely as astronomers predicted it would be.

The chattering monkeys were awed and quiet for the first time in the history of the zoo. Some birds from all parts of the world dipped their heads under their wings and slept.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The marvelous spectacle of the total eclipse of the sun was observed here today under perfect conditions.

Crowds of New Yorkers turned out early today to witness it. People gathered in hundreds in parks, in squares and at street intersections; they clustered on roof tops and in windows throughout the city. The largest early crowds were on upper Riverside Drive and in Van Cortlandt and Bronx parks, which were considered unusually good vantage points.

Activities in the bustling business section of Manhattan were suspended.

In the skyscrapers, where hundreds of thousands of office workers ordinarily are at their desks at that hour, the typewriters were silent.

Motorists on trolley cars and elevated trains watched the eclipse from the windows of their cars. The Woolworth tower, the highest office building in the world, was crowded with spectators.

Viewed from this height, the forest of spires below was bathed in a dull, silvery light as the eclipse approached its maximum. The spectators stayed until the final curtain of the spectacle, despite the bitter cold and cutting wind.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—British astronomers and laymen in this country today were wishing themselves in the northern part of the United States or Canada to enjoy the excitement of witnessing a total eclipse of the sun.

Being denied the privilege they are making the best of the prospect of a 'partial obscuration, which is all that the geographical position of the British Isles afford, excepting themselves with the thought that it is the best thing of the kind for many years past.

Careful preparations have been made for experiments in radio communication during the period of darkness, and the results of attempted changes of signals between Great Britain and America are particularly awaited.

In the Hebrides Island weather forecasts gave prospects of only clear intervals during the period of the eclipse.

The greatest phase in the London area is at 2:55 p. m. Greenwich time, when the moon is out 82 per cent of the sun's disc. Farther north the eclipse is more complete reaching 98 per cent.

ABOARD NAVAL DIRIGIBLE LOS ANGELES, Over Nantucket, Mass., Jan. 24.—6:30 a. m. off Coney Island.—Altitude 3,000 feet. Temperature 8°. Cruising speed with five engines 70 knots. Passed clouds at 2,000 feet. Clear, perfect sunshine. 9:20 a. m. all observations completed under ideal weather conditions.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Professor H. G. Taylor, making telescopic observations at the college of the city of New York, said at a total eclipse of the sun 293 years from now, or in 2218, Raymond P. Farwell, astronomy instructor at the University of Washington declared today.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—Today's solar eclipse will be a partial one in Paris, only three quarters of the sun's diameter being covered by the moon. It will begin at 2:56:03 p. m. Paris time, and will not be finished at sunset.

The greatest phase will endure only two minutes, thirty seconds. The French astronomers, therefore are making no extravagant preparations for observations of the phenomenon, but the street hawkers are anticipating a great business in colored glasses.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Ever in the open in the Bronx zoo stumbled over one another in terror during the darkness of the eclipse. The great Arctic owl hooted and flew about. The heavyweight alligator bellowed as at night.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 24.—Visual and photographic work carried out at the Harvard observatory in connection with today's eclipse of the sun were successful in spite of slightly cloudy conditions in the later stages of the eclipse announced.

From this point of observation the eclipse obscured 99 per cent of the diameter of the sun.

## OREGON SHERIFFS HOLD CONVENTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—Members of the state sheriffs' association, holding their annual convention here today conferred with Representative A. G. Rushlight of Multnomah county concerning their resolutions asking abolition of the state prohibition office. Rushlight invited them to attend the hearings of the legislative committee which is investigating the state prohibition department.

Formal resolutions were adopted this morning asking the legislature to abolish the office now held by State Prohibition Officer George L. Cleaver, and asking the legislature to pass a law giving the sheriffs 50 per cent of fines collected from liquor law violators to make it possible for the sheriffs to employ more efficient help in the enforcement of the law. The sheriffs also went on record for legislation requiring more rigid regulation of dance halls throughout the state.

Sheriff T. M. Harburt of Multnomah county was re-elected president of the sheriffs' association late yesterday. Sheriff Chrisman of Wasco county, was elected vice-president, and Sheriff Ascham of Tillamook county, was re-elected secretary.
