(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—More than 150 physicians and surgeons from Washington, Oregon and British Columbia had registered this morning for the biennial meeting here of the section of the American college of surgeons of this region.

Dr. George Crile of Cleveland gave a clinical address at a hospital which was followed by a staff conference demonstration by the staff of Tacoma general hospital, showing the necessity of careful auditing of hospital work to obtain the best results.

Dr. M. T. MacEachern of Chicago, associate director of the college of surgeons, conducting a round table discussion on hospital standardization in which representatives from the various Northwest hospitals participate, brought to the convention the annual report on the progress of hospital standardization.

The following will be found to be a suitable wax for all work except nut trees. Rosin, 4 pounds, Beeswax, 1 pound, Linseed oil, 1 pint. Melt rosin and wax, while hot thoroughly stir in the oil. It is somewhat advisable to add one-half pound of powdered charcoal, after which remove from the fire and pour in moulds of any size desired.

TEACHERS HOLD FINE MEETING

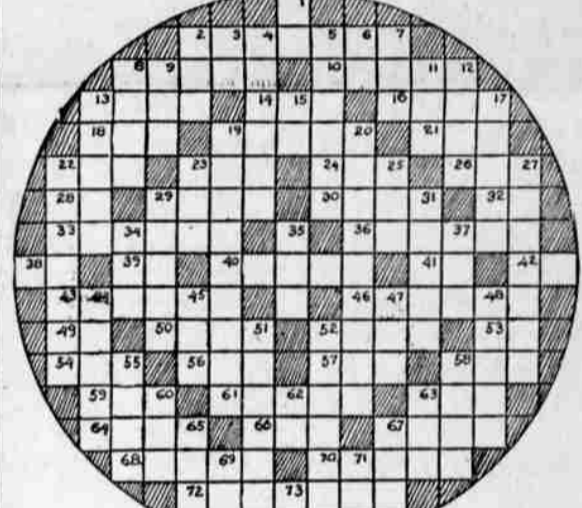

PLUMBING BILL CAUSES DISPUTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Jan. 26.—A sharp tilt developed in the house this morning when house bills 72 and 73, introduced by Rushlight, Multnomah county came up for final reading. The two bills would affect the plumbing laws of the state, the first repealing a number of existing sections and the second providing for a new plumbing code.

Cowgill of Jackson county, declared that the law would "send about 10,000 more inspectors running around the state."

Representative Fitzmaurice, of Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler opposed the measure holding that it would prohibit unlicensed persons from doing simple plumbing jobs. The two measures were referred to the revision of laws committee.

Three bills pertaining to game matters were referred to the game committee, one would prohibit beaver killing and hunting throughout the state. The house adopted senate joint resolution number six memorializing congress to appropriate funds to build a veteran's hospital at Portland on grounds which the board of regents of the University of Oregon medical school has offered to donate. The memorial points out that the lease on the Hahnemann hospital, number 77 at Portland, expires December 4, 1925.

House bill 85, the Mills convention plan, was referred to the judiciary committee on motion of representative Hammond, Clackamas county, who pointed out that a page of the bill had been omitted in printing.

A number of bills were passed by the house during the morning session. They include house bill 16 providing for a change in the time of court session in the second judicial district; house bill 23 making a slight amendment to the law pertaining to the sale by the county of land acquired through tax delinquencies; house bill 57 which would compel publication by municipal corporations of a statement on bonded indebtedness outstanding warrants and other debts in connection with notices of tax levy meetings; house bill 61, providing that the Salem justice of peace shall be placed on a flat salary of \$3400 a year instead of continuing on the fee basis, that \$190 a month be provided for clerk hire and \$50 for rent, house bill 71 giving the board of control wider scope in administering the J. T. Apperson college student's aid fund; house bill 77, permitting the interstate bridge commissioners to invest surplus funds in bonds; house bill 90, phasing the compulsory school age limit at 16 instead of 15.

Eleven new bills were introduced. FOREST SUPERVISORS (Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—Federal forest supervisors of national forests in Oregon and Washington met here today. The discussions pertained to grazing, timber sales and fire prevention, and fire fighting.
