BEAVER BILL IS RESULTING IN MUCH DISPUTE

except in a few instances. "In cattle and sheep grazing districts I find the beaver of great benefit, in that they make small dams, and reserve water holes for stock to drink from, thereby making available a much larger area of grazing districts, which will more than offset any damage that might possibly have been done in the western part of the country."

Mr. Crocker has received information that a joint hearing will be held on the beaver bill on Thursday, and expects to be present at that time. Local organizations, interested in the bill, will also participate by sending wires and messages to the members of the committee.

The Chamber of Commerce is likewise opposed to the passage of the bill, and at the meeting of the board of directors of the organization yesterday afternoon, the following resolution was presented and adopted, and copies sent to members of the legislature:

Whereas, It has come to the attention of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce that Senator Eddy of Douglas County, Oregon, has introduced senate bill No. 11, providing for the withdrawing of Douglas county, Oregon, from the district wherein the taking, killing and capturing of beaver is prohibited, and

Whereas, It is the understanding of the Roseburg chamber that this bill is introduced and is being sponsored upon the ground that beaver are doing considerable damage to private property within said county, and

Whereas, Under the present law the owner or tenant of any property has the right to take, trap or

COLD IN THE EAST

(Associated Press Local Wire.) NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Winter laid a heavy hand on the eastern states today, driving the temperature down to as low as 50 degrees below zero in parts of New England and causing New York City to shiver in weather one degree below zero, the coldest since 1922. At Malone, N. Y., near the Canadian border, unofficial records said the mercury dropped to sixty below zero. The downward swing of the thermometer came as an anti-climax to the snowstorm which visited the east yesterday. In New York City, the snow fall of 2.6 inches for this month already had broken all records for the month. The highest previous fall for the month was 21.9.

kill any beaver doing damage to such property, and

Whereas, The withdrawing of all protection from beaver would give no more protection to property within Douglas county than is given by the present law, but would simply permit indiscriminate trapping and a resultant extinction of beaver within the county, and

Whereas, There is no good reason why these animals, in sections where they are doing damage, should not be protected and permitted to perpetuate themselves, particularly in view of the fact that this state has chosen as its symbolic name the beaver state, and

Whereas, At the present time there are only a few colonies of beaver within Douglas county, Oregon, and in the main these are doing no damage to private property and are a source of interest and pleasure to those people who are interested in natural life in the open, now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, that this body go on record as being opposed to the passage of senate bill No. 11, or any act which takes from the beaver of Douglas county, which are doing no damage to private property, the protection which is now given them, and be it

Further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be mailed to Hon. R. L. Eddy, senator from Douglas county, and to Hon. Walter S. Fisher, and Hon. R. A. Hercher, representatives from Douglas county, and to the chairman of the committee of the legislature before which such bills may come.
