STONE INVITED TO PRESENT HIS CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Senators who are blocking Attorney-General Stone's nomination to the supreme court because of his part in the Wheeler case were told flatly by Mr. Stone today that the proceedings against Senator Wheeler would not only continue, but that he, at-Attorney-General, accepted full personal responsibility for them.

Facing Senator Wheeler and his Montana colleague and counsel Senator Walsh, across the conference table of the senate judiciary committee, the attorney general from the evidence gathered by the justice department for presentation to a grand jury here next week not only indicated a conspiracy to defraud the government but led to an inevitable impression that Senator Wheeler was connected with some of the actions complained of.

While mentioning directly the charge of some senators that Senator Wheeler is being "persecuted." By an attempt to try him far away from home in a case already pending in Montana, Mr. Stone declared he regarded the two proceedings as entirely independent of one another. Senator Walsh cross-questioned the attorney general at length, but the latter declined to go into detail in discussing the evidence which is to be reserved for the hearing, in which a grand jury was impaneled today in the District of Columbia supreme court.

Senator Walsh said he had heard that an attaché of the department of justice said as early as last June that Wheeler would be indicted in the District of Columbia on a conspiracy charge, but the attorney general replied no such information had come to him at that time.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Attorney General Stone was invited today by the senate judiciary committee to appear before it at a public session and make a statement relative to the controversy which is delaying his confirmation as a justice of the Supreme Court.

The principal subject of discussion was the effort of the justice department to secure a second indictment here against Senator Wheeler, democrat, of Montana, already under indictment in Montana on a charge of accepting money for practicing before a government department.

Before the doors actually were opened, however, the attorney general met the committee in executive session and it was said his preliminary statement to it might be heard in confidence. The attorney-general took with him copies of his correspondence with Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, who is Senator Wheeler's counsel. These letters containing an outline of the new leading proceeding had been kept heretofore in strictest confidence. The decision to throw the doors of the committee open to the public was unusual, the rule being that matters relating to presidential nomination must be kept secret.

The opening sessions were proposed in the committee by administration senators, who said the plan had the approval not only of the attorney general, but also of President Coolidge.

This feature comedy stunt was originated by the local Kiwanians and proved such a success last night that the boys have decided to continue with the idea. MAY WHEAT GOES TO HIGH LEVELS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—May wheat today went above the \$2 mark shortly after the opening of the board of trade session here. General buying by commission houses took place after the opening and absorbed immense profit taking sales which quickly sent initial values upward.

Initial quotations on May delivery were \$1.99 1/2 to \$2 or a gain of 1/4 to 7/8 over yesterday's. The European news continued bullish today an dwth increased buying the May delivery went fractionally above the two dollar mark, the outside figure made during the Hutchinson deal of 1898, when wheat for future delivery reached \$2.

With the exception of 1916-21, the price attained during the early dealing today was the highest since 1868 when wheat for immediate delivery sold at \$2.29 in November.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Immense trading in wheat continued with the same consistent run of buying orders which have been so much in evidence since the opening. An hour and a half after the market opened, May was up around 5 cents over yesterday's finish. Profit-taking on a big scale was absorbed readily.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—May wheat was \$2.20 a bushel at noon today on the Winnipeg grain exchange, and July had reached \$2.17 7/8. Speculative buying was heavy.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 28.—Hardy farmers' wheat was selling here today at \$2.25 a bushel for seeding purposes, according to reports. There is a big demand for seed wheat because winter wheat has been damaged by cold weather in December in some eastern Oregon counties.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The senate today voted to name as conferees on the Muscle Shoals bill Chairman Mussey Shoals, bill Chairman Norris, republican of the agricultural committee, and Senator McNary, republican of Oregon, and Smith, democrat, South Carolina.

Along with the excitement there were those who displayed keen disappointment chiefly among those who failed to share in the jollification were the traders who feared the market would not reach the coveted goal and disposed of their holdings yesterday. Toward the finish yesterday when wheat reached \$1.99 1/2 many experts advised selling.

Each additional report received in the pit increased the excitement of the feverish traders.

TOLEDO HAS BIG FIRE

TOLEDO, Ohio, Jan. 28.—One of the most spectacular fires in the history of Toledo is sweeping the Parazon Refining company plant. At 2:30 p. m. 15 tanks, stills and steamers filled with gasoline and oil had been destroyed and several other tanks were threatened. The loss will total a half million dollars, it is said.
