NEW MATERIAL GIVES BOOST TO CUBS' CHANCES

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Acquisition of three sterling veterans from Pittsburgh, the recovery of a trio of cub players whose injuries crippled the team last fall and the signing of George Gibson, as coach and assistant manager to handle the 14 pitchers on the club's roster, has boosted the pennant prospects of the Chicago Nationals for the 1925 season, according to President William Veech.

The three players who came to the Cubs in exchange for Geo. Granham, second baseman; Vic Aldridge, pitcher, and first baseman Fred Schaus, are Wilbur Cooper, pitcher, "Rabbit" Maravilla, second baseman, and Charley Grimm, first baseman.

Charles Hollocher, shortstop, 31 last year, says he will be able to return to his old position this spring. Barney Friberg, third baseman, who had a broken leg last season, has fully recovered.

The Cubs also obtained Clarke A. Rittenker, a rangy infielder from the coast league, and he may be inserted at short or even at third. "Sparky" Adams, diminutive shortstop, also is available for the in-

terior defense. Friberg may be sent to center field. The other two regulars probably will be Denver Grishby and Cliff Heathcote. Hack Miller and Arnold Stutz will undoubtedly be retained to fill in.

Cooper, Grover Alexander, Vic Keen and Tony Kauffman give the Cubs a strong quartet of mainstays. In addition to these four regulars, the Cubs has about a dozen others, the largest number ever taken on a training trip.

Gabby Hartnett and Bob O'Farrell will do the bulk of the catching.

SCOUTING AND THE AMERICAN LEGION

The national headquarters of the American Legion has issued a bulletin on Americanism, under the heading, "Boy Scout Work for Every Post."

"They urge that every American Legion Post take up some sort of Boy Scout work. 'Boys follow me' reads the appeal, and goes on to say that a definite responsibility rests upon the men of the nation.

"Scouting has been evolved for the prime purpose of making men out of boys. While it may be termed a game, it is a method to test the coordination, the application, the courage, the loyalty, the self reliance, the patriotism, and the honor needed by a boy to become the man of the future. Its relation to the Legion is seen in the pledge of scouts to 'Be Prepared,' and 'To Do a Good Turn Daily.' It is not military, it is democratic, it does not tend to one phase of character development, but to general responsibilities."

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE TALKS TO FOREIGN MISSIONS CONFERENCE REGARDING CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT

(Associated Press Special Wire.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Christian churches and governments were declared by President Coolidge today to have "no greater responsibility than to make sure that the best, and not the worst, of which Christian society is capable, shall be given to the other people."

This with other views on the foreign missionary question were presented by the president in an address to the meeting here of the foreign missions conference of North America, an interdenominational gathering of the foreign mission interests in the Protestant churches of the United States and Canada.

"Not everything that the men of Christian countries have carried to the other peoples of the world has been good and helpful to those who have received it," the president said, "we know that the missionary movements have repeatedly been hampered and at times frustrated, because some calling themselves Christians and assuming they represented Christian civilization has been actuated by un-Christian motives."

"Our missionary efforts will be more effective, just in proportion as we shall render them in the same spirit of brotherhood and charity which marked the earliest Christian missions."

Mr. Coolidge emphasized that the Christian nations had become in a practical as well as a spiritual sense, charged with a great trust for civilization. In the discharge of this trust, particularly in its spiritual phases, true service he asserted could be rendered only "under the inspiration of a broad and genuine liberalism."

"It must rest on tolerances," he declared. "It must realize the spirit of brotherhood, and the foundation of all missionary effort abroad must be tolerated and
