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TRANS-OCEANIC NEWS FLASHES

PARIS, Jan. 29.—Twenty department stores and other establishments dealing in clothing in Paris have promised the prefect of police that beginning on Monday they will install "tri-colored counters" where, under the national colors, will be sold, simple durable, warm clothing at the lowest possible prices.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—An increase of nearly 10,000,000 pounds sterling in the British naval estimates for the coming fiscal year is said to have been demanded by the admiralty and to be meeting with resistance from the treasury.

Earl Beatty, first sea lord, has submitted estimates of 65,050,000 pounds, maintaining that this is the lowest figure compatible with the safety of the nation.

The estimates for the current year were 55,800,000 pounds, and the proposed increase is said to be necessitated by continuance of the cruiser building program and the contemplated construction of more destroyers and submarines.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Winston Churchill whose business it is to scrutinize the estimates of all departments before submitting them to parliament in the budget, opposes the admiralty claim. It is declared, on the ground of economy.

NEW ENGLAND IS AGAIN IN GRIP OF HEAVY SNOW FALL

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—With street crossings clogged with slush and sidewalks ice coated under a deceptive layer of wet snow, New York today struggled with the aftermath of a fifth severe snow of the winter.

All of New England was suffering from the effects of the storm, several inches of snow being added to that already left by preceding storms. In most sections the temperature rose 20 or more degrees, northern Vermont reporting a rise of 40 degrees within 48 hours, the mercury reaching 20 degrees above zero.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 29.—One of the worst snow storms in ten years swept and swirled across New York state today, paralyzing traffic, causing many accidents and closing schools in many cities.

Several points in Vermont reported the heaviest snowfall in 20 years. At St. Albans, three feet of snow was reported.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Ice floes reported to be the heaviest in 20 years interrupted ferry traffic in the East and Hudson rivers today. Boats with thousands of passengers aboard were held for hours while tugs labored to relieve them.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Because of a large number of cases of grippe, physicians here made unusual efforts to visit the patients today, although heavy snow fall prevented automobile traffic.

Several younger physicians solved the problem by using alphas and snow shoes. Others obtained horses, but there was a scarcity of sleds and cutters. Some of the older physicians used saddles and went

about like the old mountaineer physicians.

SEABRIGHT, N. J., Jan. 30.—Daylight revealed the captain and four men clinging to the rigging of a four masted lumber laden schooner Comnack, Norfolk for New York, which was aground on a reef last night in a gale which piled seas higher than seen here before in several years.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 30.—An eastbound New York central passenger train due here at 11:40 last night arrived at 8:30 o'clock today. It had been stalled all night in a snow drift at Woodward.

The drifts had been mounted to nine feet at some places and the snow was five feet on the level in the western parts of the state, reports said.
