LICENSE PLATES TO GIVE TROUBLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—Traffic cops whose eyes are not all they should be, are looking for trouble this year because of the color scheme adopted by Oregon and California for their license plates. Both have chosen yellow and black. Officials of both states, while deprecating the same choice and having a tendency to yell "copy cat" at each other, claim that these will be sufficient differences between the style of the plates to prevent confusion and answer all practical purposes.

THE Oregon numerals will run straight and will correspond to the number of motor vehicles in the state, while California, after six figures have been passed, will ring in the alphabet as a means of paring down the number of figures. The California plates also are slightly larger than those for Oregon.

CARDINALS INTO 1925 RACE WITH UNCHANGED CREW

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 31.—With no outstanding trades made by manager Branch Rickey to strengthen the hurling staff, the St. Louis Cardinals appear to be little stronger for this year's national league drive than in 1924 when they finished sixth. The hitting of the team last season was good and the fielding fair. The pitching generally was considered the weak link, although several hurling prospects are to receive tryouts, besides which Duster Mails, veteran southpaw, has been obtained from Oakland, the outlook as a whole is uncertain in this respect.

Of the veteran twirling talent, Dickerman and Sotera pitched fairly good ball last season. The others who will be back are Haines, Sherdel, Stuart and Dyer. Mike Gonzales, the Cuban, is expected to do the bulk of the catching this year. Others are Niesler and Clemens, with the team last season. Three others from the minors will be given tryouts. The team's main strength lies in the infield with Bottomley at first, Hornsby at second and Cooney at shortstop considered as fixtures. Hornsby, batted .422 last season, the highest mark in modern big league history.

Third base is an open question with Frisgan, Lester Bell and Toporec, as leading candidates. Another problem for Rickey to solve is the outfield. The Cards have enough outfielders for two or three teams. Blades, Douthitt, Hafey, Holm, Mueller, Myers, Shinnars and Jack Smith comprise the candidates. Smith is considered the pick of the lock and almost certain to start in right, with Blades in left. Center field is uncertain, especially since Rickey may use Holm behind the bat. The Cardinals will train at Stockton, Calif., where they will gather on or about February 22. A schedule of 27 exhibition games has been arranged on the Pacific coast.

Clow, editor of Broadway Brevities, convicted of using the mails to defraud, was sentenced today to serve six years and one day in the Atlanta penitentiary. He was also fined \$6,000. Albert S. Brown, an advertising solicitor for the periodical, was sentenced to two years. The Brevities corporation was fined \$13,000. Nat Kunnes, another solicitor, was ordered held in the custody of the United States marshal for one week pending further investigation.

ROUMANIA ORDERS BAPTIST TEACHER TO QUIT COUNTRY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BUCHAREST, Rumania, Jan. 31.—The Rumanian authorities have ordered the Rev. Daniel Hurley, an American citizen to leave the country within 15 days. No charges are preferred against him. The order is based on a recent law granting the authorities power to order foreigners considered undesirable to quit the country. The law ostensibly was intended to counteract the spread of communist propaganda. Mr. Hurley was sent here from the United States about a year ago by the Southern Baptist mission board as a teacher in the seminary

GIBBONS MAKES QUICK FINISH OF "TINY" HERMANN

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 31.—Tommy Gibbons gave away forty-five pounds and ten years to "Tiny" Jim Herman of Omaha, in a meeting here last night, but stopped the western giant in the third round with a punch so hard that Herman did not wake up for five minutes. Herman was down for a count of nine three times in the second round and was knocked down once before the final punch in the third round. Gibbons weighed 179 and Herman 225. Gibbons made definite claim to the world's heavyweight boxing title following his defeat of Herman.

Gibbons believes he is the man whose record entitles him to the crown, Jack Dempsey has not defended for more than a year and which the champion is declaring he will relinquish next May. In defense of his claim, Gibbons proposes he is ready to meet any logical contender for the title. He indicated Harry Wills was at the head of the list of men who might challenge his claim. He is ready to box Wills, he declared.

In making claim to the title, Gibbons also announced he was out of the light heavyweight ranks. Gibbons's decision to eliminate himself from the lighter division came at the end of his training for the Herman bout. He reduced as far as he thought desirable and "dried out" as much as possible. The result was 179 pounds. "I was open to meet any of them in past," Gibbons declared in making emphatic declaration that he was open to meet any logical contender for the title. "And I am open now to meet any members of my class that will get into the ring with me. Wills probably is in the lead for consideration for a match and I am ready to box him. Firpo and Jack Renault are others and I am open to meet them."

Jack Dempsey's reply to Tommy Gibbons's claim of last night to the world's heavyweight boxing championship was this statement made late today: "I have told Jack Kearns to arrange a title bout." He did not specify that the bout should be with Gibbons.
