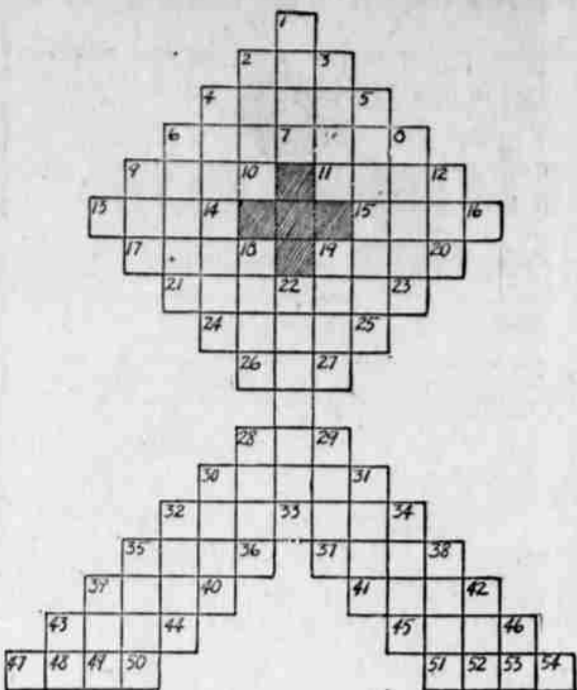


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

How to Solve Puzzle.

The best way to solve this crossword puzzle is to run over the list of horizontal and vertical synonyms in search of evident or "easy" words. If horizontal, the word you are looking for must extend crosswise from the number to the first shaded stop on the right; if vertical, it must extend downward from the number to the first shaded stop below. When finished, the words should read equally well crosswise and downward.

SPORT SHORTS British Columbia is to usher in the major golf tournament season of the Pacific Northwest at Easter when provincial title events for men and women are to be held at the Colwood Country Club, Victoria, B. C. A number of players from California, Oregon and Washington are to compete. Nine players have so far signed contracts with the Seattle baseball club for the 1925 season, they are: Frank Tobin, catcher; Harvey "Suds" Sutherland, pitcher; John Zwick, catcher; Frank Emmer, infielder; Steve Cheek, pitcher; Oscar Wood, pitcher; Lloyd Maddock, pitcher; Francis Fairbanks, outfielder; and Harry Nielson, infielder. An order designed to prevent fight fans from expressing disapproval of referee's decisions by showering the ring with cushions, pop bottles and other movable objects, was issued at Los Angeles by Seth Strelinger, chairman of the state boxing commission. The order which came as the result of a demonstration at a Hollywood arena last Friday in which a number of fans were displeased over a decision and said so with cushions and other convenient missiles, prohibits the sale of cushions and of soft drinks in bottles. The order is general and applies to all arenas in the state.
