Public Gets Inning Tonight.

Just what recommendations will come from the special committee investigating the state prohibition department, is still a matter of much uncertainty, although the committee is expected to conclude its deliberations and hearings early this week. It is not believed further witnesses will be summoned. A public hearing on the whole subject is to take place tonight in the senate chamber at 7:30 o'clock for anyone who desires to be heard.

Arising on a question of personal privilege this morning, Senator Garland, chairman of the committee investigating the state prohibition department, answered what he termed propaganda that has gone out over the state to the effect that the committee had been discourteous to Governor Pierce. He said he did not know the origin of the propaganda but that he and other members of the committee had received dozens of letters of protest as a result of the reports.

Newspaper Syndicate Offers To Aid Health Department—WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Secretary Wilbur and Admiral Eberle, chief of naval operations, declared today the navy department had no practicable way of expediting shipments of anti-diphtheria serum to Nome by the employment of navy surface ships or aircraft. Ice conditions on the Alaskan coast are such that a naval vessel carrying an airplane could not approach close enough to Nome to permit an air flight to that place.

The secretary received a telegram from the North American Newspaper Alliance urging that a ship be sent from the Pacific coast, carrying an airplane to be launched at a point off the Alaskan coast within about 300 miles of Nome. The communication contained an offer on the part of the alliance to provide a bacteriologist and the necessary medical equipment.

AERIAL TAXICAB SERVICE TO START

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—An aerial taxicab service combining the convenience of the ordinary taxicab and the airplane, will be inaugurated here next April through a consolidation of the airplane interests of Walter T. Varney and the Checker Cab company, according to announcement made by officers of the combined concerns.

Service is expected to start April 5. The busy man or tourist anxious to reach the place where he intends to make a deal or to see as much of the state as possible "between trains" will, under the arrangement made possible, call on the company's cabs, be whisked to the Varney field here, board a plane waiting with engines running, and be off into the air for his destination. At the landing field there another cab will be waiting to take him downtown or wherever he wants to go.

It has been estimated that the travel to Sacramento will be reduced to one hour, to Los Angeles to four hours, and to other points in proportion of time.

Scope of the air cab service will be limited to such points as are in greatest demand until the volume of travel increases. Capital of \$500,000 already subscribed will be sufficient to carry on the work for sometime until the land-air arrangement becomes a matter of course, which company officials hope it will do. Climatic conditions are such that Varney believes his planes will be able to maintain service every day throughout the year.

Each plane will carry two passengers, a pilot and hand luggage. Two passengers flying for the same destination will be given a rate of 20 cents per passenger per mile, or five cents lower than the present individual land cab rates for long distances.

Varney expects the service to be popular with tourists, particularly for those whose stay in the state is limited or who want to see something of the interior before taking the steamer here. A tourist trip to Yosemite Valley and return, for instance, could be made in three hours. Airplanes are not allowed to land in the Yosemite valley, but may fly over as much as they please.

TO RECONSTRUCT ROSEBURG-EUGENE TELEPHONE LINE

John R. Farrington, manager of the local telephone exchange, today received word that approval has been given for the reconstruction of 32 miles of toll line on the Portland-San Francisco circuit. On the Roseburg-Eugene section, the work will consist of moving to new location, the placing of 1,000 new poles, 2,000 cross arms, 180 archers, stringing 485 miles of No. 104 copper wire and 125 miles of No. 145 copper wire. The work will be started on April 1 and will be completed about December 1. The cost of the improvement is estimated at \$119,000.

The work will provide two additional circuits between Eugene and Cottage Grove and one new circuit between Cottage Grove and Roseburg.

The construction of the line has been made necessary by deterioration and also the location of the highway and high power lines requiring new leads.

RECLAMATION BILL TO AID SETTLERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Government aid to settlers on new reclamation projects was approved today by the senate reclamation committee in ordering reported to the senate a bill introduced by Senator Kendrick.

The measure provides for future settlers of amounts up to \$2,000 at four percent.

Loans would be authorized up to 60 percent of the improvements made by the settler or up to that amount of cattle purchased by him.

The secretary of the interior would be authorized the settling of the projects. The original proposal in the measure for the government to purchase the land was eliminated.

Senator Kendrick said the bill would do away with lottery system of settling projects, resulting in greater community interest and more co-operative production and distribution on projects. It was endorsed by commissioner Mond of the reclamation bureau, the budget bureau and Secretary Work.

Projects under construction which would be affected by the measure are portions of the Shoshone, Wyo., and the Kittitas and Baker projects in Washington.

PARIS FASHIONS FOR SPRING AFFECTED BY WAR IN CHINA

PARIS, Jan. 29.—China's civil war has had far-reaching effects in Paris fashion centers, influencing everywhere the selection of materials for spring models already in the course of preparation in the great dressmaking houses in spite of the fact that the winter season has barely got under way.

Far eastern silks, of Chinese color designs and bearing such names as China crepe, crepe Marjunga and Chi-Chin, are being extensively used in the creation of delectable models to be launched at Antwerp and Louchevaine next spring, in which promises to be one of the liveliest seasons for feminine raiment.

Solid colors such as gray, sky-blue or pale green, with wide borders done in hennas, yellows and soft shades of lavender predominate.

Some carry designs as lavens that two or three patterns would make a search for a petite person. One pattern is a large yellow sunflower with a brown center on a white background. Another sample of the Chinese influence is a large all-over

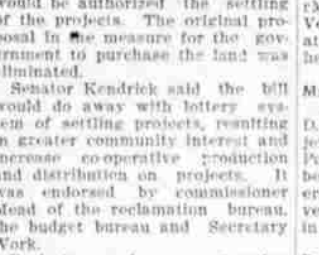
