### WORLD'S GREATEST FLYER TO BE BUILT AT AKRON, OHIO.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
AKRON, Ohio, Feb. 2. — Dr. Karl Arnstine, designer of the giant ZR-3, which crossed the Atlantic ocean from Germany in a non-stop flight, has been selected to draw the plans for the Goodyear-Zeppelin Corporation's proposed giant air liner. When completed this airship will be twice as large as any flyer ever built and will be able to go half way round the world without a stop. Dr. Arnstine formerly was chief engineer of the German Zeppelin company and has drawn plans for more than 100 dirigibles.

The proposed ship will have a gas capacity of more than 5,000,000 cubic feet, twice as great as either the ZR-3, now christened the Los Angeles, or the Shenandoah. Officials have not definitely determined whether the dirigible would be equipped with a passenger cabin hanging from the keel of the vessel, with a promenade deck, and a steamship-like interior, or whether it would maintain a regular two-day schedule between New York and London, if used for that purpose.

Engineers plan the new ship to be between 850 and 950 feet long, with a maximum diameter of 115 to 120 feet, the control

car hanging ten feet lower. The Shenandoah is 680 feet long and 78 feet in diameter, while the ZR-3 is 660 feet long with a diameter of 101.5 feet.

The proposed ship would be powered by motors developing 4,000 horse-power as against 1,500 of the Shenandoah and 2,000 of the ZR-3.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. — Among the things the government intends to do during the coming year is to make an intensive study of sea water, its characteristics, and phenomena.

The Navy Department is planning to furnish a boat, the Bureau of Standards will furnish a staff and instrument, and a number of other scientific branches of the government will be represented in the personnel of the expedition.

### SOVIET PREDICTS U. S. RECOGNITION WITHIN THE YEAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MOSCOW, Feb. 3. — The soviet is daily becoming more sanguine of American recognition and Bolsheviki officials seldom lose an opportunity to tell the people the United States will be forced to reestablish relations with Russia before the end of the present year.

Addressing a large gathering of Kharlov communists yesterday, Christian Rakovsky, soviet charge d'affaires in London, who is on a special speaking tour, said: "I am audacious enough to prophesy that the United States will recognize us this year, not because I have received information from private sources, but because the prevailing international situation brought about by the recognition of Soviet Russia by France, Japan, Italy and other countries, will compel America to recognize us too."

"Acceptance by Europe of the Dawes plan means that the United States will play an increasingly large part in international affairs. It means indirectly that the United States will be obliged finally to recognize Soviet Russia."

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## 19 CONGRESSMEN ENLIST IN FIGHT ON VOLSTEAD ACT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Feb. 3. — Nineteen democratic members of congress from New York have pledged themselves to support an organization formed last night to seek repeal of the Volstead Act.

More than 1,000 men and women attended the dinner at which the organization was formed. Resolutions for affiliation of the organization with the association against the prohibition amendment were unanimously adopted.

In addition to the congressmen who expressed their support of the organization's purpose, United States Senator James W. Wadsworth of this state, sent to the organizers a letter in which he said: "Judging from your description of the purposes of the dinner, I think I can say I am in general sympathy with them."

The movement is considered by its organizers as the most determined step yet taken toward the repeal of the Volstead Act.

Leaders of the organization plan to begin without delay the forming of units in every congressional district in the country.

### JANUARY WAS NORMAL MONTH

The month of January was long on warmth, short on rain and altogether a nearly normal month from the weather aspect, according to the monthly meteorological summary issued by Wm. Bell, meteorologist.

The average temperature for the month was 45.5 degrees, while the normal is 43.2 degrees. The highest temperature during the month was 61 degrees on the 29th, and the lowest was 31 degrees on the 15th. The highest recorded in January in 48 years was 71 degrees, and the lowest during that period 6 degrees below.

The total rainfall for the month was 4.26 inches, while the normal is 5.70 inches. From September 1, 1924 to Jan. 31, 1925, the recorded rainfall is 28.18 inches, the normal for that period being 19.64, leaving an excess of 8.54 inches for the season.

There were only four days in the month in which the sun did not make its appearance for at least a short time, and on several of the days there were more than five hours of sunshine, while on the 21st Old Sol hid his stuff for six hours and 42 minutes.

The month also maintained Roseburg's record for the lowest wind velocity, for the average movement was 2.7 miles per hour. The highest wind recorded was a velocity of 24 miles an hour on the 13th.
