FARM NEWS

Spray Program for Peaches, Apricots, Almonds and Cherries

The standard spray material for the control of the majority of fungus diseases in peaches, apricots, cherries, apricots and almonds has been found to be Bordeaux Mixture. This valued fungicide like most good things is comparatively simple in its manufacture. Long experimentation has shown, however, that certain requirements are necessary in the selection of the base materials. The mixture is made of lump lime and copper sulphate, commonly known as blue vitriol. The proportions of lime and vitriol vary with the variety of fruits and date of application.

The proper strength of Bordeaux to apply at this time upon peaches, apricots and almonds is known as the dormant spray or 6-6-50 formula.

Analysis of this formula would read: 6 pounds of lump lime, 6 pounds of vitriol to each 50 gallons spray. The material is made by slacking the lime with a small quantity of water and dissolving the vitriol by using three or four gallons of hot water. Some check should be kept of the amount of water used in both cases as the total when mixed should equal 50 gallons when ready for use.

Where several hundred gallons of spray is to be made the following plan will prove most practical. Slack 50 pounds of the best lump lime available in 25 gallons water, after thorough slacking is accomplished, strain through a sack or other screen into a 50 gallon barrel, then add 25 gallon water. Take 50 pounds vitriol place in two sacks of 25 pounds each and suspend it in another barrel containing 50 gallons water. These barrels represent the stock solution and can be kept some time without loss. If it is desired to make 50 gallons of spray thoroughly, stir the contents of both barrels and dip out 50 gallons from each barrel and pour both solutions through a copper strainer into the spray tank at the same time, then add 35 gallons water and thoroughly agitate before spraying. Larger quantities are prepared by simply doubling the quantity used, being careful to maintain the same ratio as used for the first 50 gallons.

The 6-6-50 formula should be applied without delay upon peaches, apricots and almonds. The weather conditions may not be at all satisfactory, nevertheless, if it is not done at this time the grower can not hope to get control of peach leaf curl and monilia blight in apricots and almonds. 6-6-50 formula should be applied upon cherries just as the fruit buds show the first tips of the flower petals. This is also a vital time for the best control of blossom blight in peaches.

All cane fruits and rose bushes should be sprayed with the same formula as soon as the first buds start growth. There are several prepared Bordeaux mixtures for sale upon the market and when properly prepared are good, but if it is not done at this time the grower can not hope to get control of peach leaf curl and monilia blight in apricots and almonds. 6-6-50 formula should be applied upon cherries just as the fruit buds show the first tips of the flower petals. This is also a vital time for the best control of blossom blight in peaches.

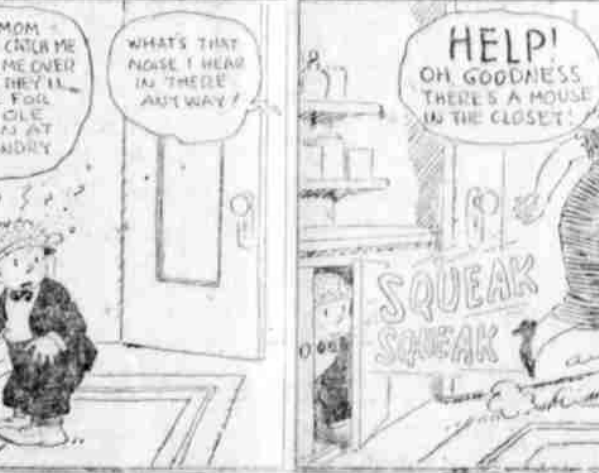
