NO AGREEMENT AT OPIUM WRANGLE

GENEVA, Feb. 6.—The American delegation, who withdrew from the international opium conference and representative Porter and his associates plan to leave Geneva tonight, and to sail for home next Thursday on the steamship President Harding.

Mr. Porter today officially informed the conference that despite the more than two months of negotiation and the repeated adjournments it was clear that the purpose for which the conference had been called could not be accomplished.

The American withdrawal was announced in a letter from Mr. Porter to M. Seiple, president of the conference, saying:

"In pursuance of the authorization of the Fujus, the American delegation, to its deep regret finds itself unable longer to participate in the deliberations of the opium conference."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The withdrawal of the American delegation from the Geneva opium conference was authorized by President Coolidge.

The president advised Chairman Porter of the American delegation that he might at his discretion withdraw from the conference, since it appeared that no agreement could be reached which would be satisfactory to the American delegates.

The American decision came as a stunning blow to all of the delegates. While it had been thought that the representatives of the United States would NOT sign the anti-narcotic convention agreement now completed, the general expectation had been that they would remain until the end and then announce they would consider the question of signature.

The American break away from the conference apparently does NOT mean its collapse, as at an official meeting of the most important of its commissions today the trend of the speeches was that while the American decision was keenly regretted, the work must be pushed on and practical results achieved if possible.

that nonresident teachers accepting employment in Oregon shall have a rating of 90 per cent in all subjects included in the examination, aroused a storm of protest in the senate yesterday and was sent back to the committee for reconsideration.

Senator Eddy charged that the present rating of 90 per cent affecting local teachers was too high and that it should be reduced. His contention had the support of Senator Joseph and Staples. Senator Eddy said the rating should be reduced to 80 per cent for both local and nonresident teachers.

Raise For Dist. Attorneys
District attorneys in Oregon would receive a general increase under house bill 213 passed by the house this morning. Approximately \$15,000 a year would be added to the total salaries of district attorneys by the bill. The increase would be taken care of by a fee of \$5, to be charged in all divorce case filings.

House bill 168 introduced by Hurlbut, Multnomah county, was put to sleep this morning by indefinite postponement. The measure was designed to greatly limit the tax exemption of religious and charitable institutions.

Coach Doubet and the boys and girls' basketball teams of R. H. S. left this morning for Grants Pass, where they will meet the teams of that high school. This is to be the first game played Grants Pass this year, and a good game is expected. A number of rooters left in cars and on the train, and it is expected that a number will leave this afternoon to attend the game.
