The hat for evening is most successful when designed in turban style of brilliant metallic material, in graceful folds. Miss Talmadge wears hers closely fitted to the head, with two folds rising higher above the crown.

Other hats for formal occasions which are in the mode are those of grosgrain ribbon, also fashioned in turban style, with the crown distinctly higher than formerly worn. Grosgrain ribbon in beige shade is the smartest thing at present from Paris and may be correctly worn with any shade gown.

Beige, which is a leading color favorite, is particularly well chosen to wear with a gown in black as the mode for black and white is still worn by the smartly dressed person.

Felt hats which are usually selected to accompany the sports costume, are welcomed as the correct hat to accompany the frock for more formal occasions. They are particularly charming this spring in the smartest shades, beige.

Gowns which rise higher than those associated with the long popular cloche or its successor, the square crowned hat, are made different by the dents which are placed in the exceedingly high crowns.

The new cylinder shape, which is very chic, is made of black grosgrain ribbon, frequently brightened by a spray of brilliant feathers or a low placed fantasy.

The hat which is high of crown is often made fetching by a smart placing of a bow on the highest spot, or two dents which break the lines.
