## COAST BASKETEERS BATTLE TONIGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 7.—Four leaders in the northern section of the Pacific coast and inter-collegiate basketball conference are to be seen in action on two floors tonight.

Washington is to play the Washington state college outfit here, and the Oregon Aggies are to tangle with Oregon at Corvallis. The Aggies lead in the Northwest conference with a percentage of .900 followed by Washington with .875, Oregon 367 and Washington S. C. .813. In the northern division of the coast league, Oregon Aggies has a percentage of .890; Washington .750; and Oregon and W. S. C. .590.

The Cougars were reported handicapped with Gehrels, regular center, nursing an injured ankle. Both quarters have spent a week in preparing for a strenuous contest.

Daintiness is the keynote of the spring mode. Many of the newest gowns are made with the slender basque bodies and the ruffled skirt and others of chiffon and various soft fabrics are made with dainty, lace petticoats which show through the outer material.

Gowns for matrons, while not adhering strictly to the fluffy type of skirt, have aprons, pleated necks, etc., which add a feminine note at the same time keeping the straight-line silhouette. We are already noticing the change toward the feminine in millinery. The felt hat is doomed to oblivion, according to buyers returning from Paris.
