have or are reading in Douglas county. He further stated that he follows the bulletin as it comes out each Monday morning with a great deal of interest and has been able to reap much benefit thereby in his dealings with the public.

A. C. Marsters took the floor and explained house bill No. 150, introduced in our legislative assembly by Representative Walter Fisher. The bill provides that any person uttering or delivering a check which upon its presentation at the bank has not sufficient funds with which to cover it shall upon conviction be fined not to exceed \$1000 and imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year. Mr. Marsters stated that he believed the bill would fill a long felt want and asked that the secretary write a letter to Mr. Fisher complimenting him on his house bill. In talking of the fake advertising, Mr. Marsters stated that a great many dollars had been saved by the cooperation of our local association in preventing fakers from selling advertising which was of no direct benefit to anyone and he further stated that a great deal more benefit could be derived by using our local medium for advertising than paying these smooth voiced solicitors.

The election of officers was in order and after casting the ballots Oliver Johnson was elected as president, Dean Bubar, vice-president, Ernest Applewhite, treasurer, C. A. Leffwood, acting secretary and Albert Bashford, Ben Zigler and E. F. Mauden, directors.

Mr. Marsters, the retiring president, thanked the members of the association for their loyal support and stated that he felt that the association had been of a great deal of value to its members and he hoped that it would continue to be. He said that he hoped that the members would cooperate and make use of the association and further assured them that he would be glad to assist at any time and in any way that he could.

The meeting was very successful and many members were in attendance. General discussion on the topics on the program proved very interesting to the merchants until well towards midnight and several of them gave their views of the credit situation and stated that the local association had a very efficient system and that they had received valuable benefit as members.

TACOMA BANDITS SHOOT MANAGER AND TAKE \$3400

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
TACOMA, Feb. 7.—Three bandits this morning held up two employees of the National Bank of Tacoma, seriously wounded one of them, and escaped with a netful containing \$3400 in cash.

The robbery was committed in front of an agency of the bank at 38th and Yakima streets. Harry Schmidt, manager of the agency, and Ray West, a bank messenger, were taking the cash from the main bank to the agency. As the two men stepped off a street car the three bandits drew up in an automobile and stopped them. Schmidt was shot in the back without warning, and the bandits snatched up the netful and fled in their car.

Schmidt was taken to a hospital where his condition was found to be serious. All available police were sent out in search of the bandits.

Several weeks ago another agency of the bank had been robbed in a similar manner.

90-YEAR-SOLON REGALES CONGRESS IN "SWAN SONG"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Representative Sherwood, democrat, Ohio, civil war veteran, and at the age of 90 the oldest member of the house, today delivered his "swan song" treating members to reminiscences of yesteryear.

He recalled that it was 50 years since he had entered congress and that only one of his colleagues at that time is alive—"Uncle Joe Cannon," said Sherwood, who is an ardent advocate of prohibition modification, declared that in his younger days "those two crime breeders, the bootlegger's league and the anti-Saloon League, had got yet appeared."

The Ohio representative contrasted the present day with the days when he entered congress. "The country had no automobiles, no wireless, no airplanes, no rained music. Prize fighting was not then our popular entertainment. Tainted actresses were not then our popular stars of the stage. We had no jazz music. The glorious old war songs of heroic memory and patriotic inspiration had not been supplanted by "Captain Jinks of the Horse Marines," "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here," "Yes, We Have No Bananas" and similar jargons, and the grand plays of Shakespeare and plays of high moral import had not been supplanted by the vulgar and smutty vaudeville."

"Fish was then a territory presented by the distinguished Mormon Elder, Cannon," he continued. "His four wives, sitting side by side in the members gallery without cosmetic adornment, were the object of all observers, as quiet and as uncomplaining as long-planted oysters in Lynn Haven Bay. This was before Dr. Cook discovered the North Pole and before the Rev. Billy Sunday drove the devil out of Washington."

Members of congress were saluted at \$5,000 a year; we were allowed no secretary—we had to rent our offices out of our salary and we had to take up in hand to answer kicking letters from constituents.

"There were no typewriting machines. The speaker had to parliamentary expert."

"We had no tariff experts to confuse the ordinary congressman and no calendar Wednesday. We had no secretary of agriculture, hence the farmers were contented and reasonably prosperous."
