DRAB VILLAGES ARE BEING BEAUTIFIED

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Beauty is overtaking the drab American village, according to observations of the department of agriculture in a current study of village planning and its benefits.

Although 20,000,000 persons live in American villages and a farming population of 30,000,000 largely depends upon them for business, educational and social purposes, the department found them "usually unattractive and often very ugly" suffering by comparison in this respect with those of other countries. The start that is being made towards improvement and beautification has proven in every case, it was said, a material asset as well as an aesthetic one.

Pointing out that "as the farmer's chief point of contact with outside interests the village can make a big contribution to the happiness of farm life," the department asserted that an attractive village and good streets and convenient approaches and recreation spots were "an important influence on stabilizing farm life and counteracting the attractions of the city for the young people of the farm."

POPE MAY BE PLANNING A WORLD TOUR

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

ROME, Feb. 11.—All attempts to negotiate a concordat between the Vatican and the Italian government have failed because the Holy See it is stated in circles close to the government, has made it an initial condition that the concordat be acknowledged by all the powers, thus becoming an international agreement. This would enable any signatory party to interfere in what Italy considers her own internal affairs, namely, her relations with the Vatican.

The London Morning Post today printed an item saying that Roman Catholics in Great Britain said they considered likelihood of a concordat reached soon between the Pope and Premier Mussolini, in which case His Holiness prepared to make a tour of the world.

It is understood that Premier Mussolini has not lost hope of finding a solution satisfactory to both parties, but nothing positive has resulted.

The report reaching here that, once the concordat was concluded, the Pope would make a tour of the world, is given no credence.

MYSTERY OF MAN'S DEATH IS UNSOLVED

LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 11.—The mystery surrounding the death and identity of a man who posed to be B. Brady of Toronto, Canada, remained unsolved today. The coroners jury last night returned a verdict of "death from unknown causes," the body was found near La Grande Sunday.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 11.—Two more arrests were made last night by Tacoma and Seattle police in the roundup of suspects for the slaying of Harry H. Schmidt, Tacoma banker, Saturday morning, making a total of six held for investigation.

At 10:30 o'clock last night Detectives John Paulson and August V. Piel, of Tacoma, arrested Arden Lloyd, 21, at 626 University Street, Seattle. He was brought here at 1 o'clock this morning and is held in the Tacoma city jail.

Scarcely had the Tacoma officers arrived home when Captain of Detectives Charles Tennant, at Seattle, telephoned that he had arrested a man giving the name of Goodman and were holding him for investigation.

Detectives Paulson and St. Pierre declined to give details of evidence against Lloyd but he admitted he was the husband of the woman held here and known as Jane Moore. He said she had been here three weeks and was acquainted with Ruby Melnia, also being held for investigation. An attempt will be made to have the two men identified this morning.

SAN FRANCISCO PEOPLE USE FERRY BOATS.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—More people commute by water to San Francisco daily than to any other city in the United States except New York, it has been estimated here.

Ferry boats during 1924 carried 35,427,239 persons, or just about half the population of the United States, which represented an increase of 786,748 passengers over the preceding year.

Of the total number, 4,202,966 were carried in automobiles on vehicular ferries. This traffic gained a half million in 1924 over 1923.

A nice problem for a winter evening would be to figure out, on the above basis, how long it would take the entire population of the nation to cross San Francisco bay at the commuter rate with three separate ferries leaving each side every twenty minutes between 6 a. m. and midnight, and carrying about 500 people each, which is said to be a good average.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The house commerce committee today by a vote of 11 to 6 declined to report the Gooding bill, prohibiting higher railroad freight rates for short hauls than for long hauls over the same route.

WM. JARDINE OF KANSAS MAY BE SECTY. OF AGRIC.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Although the White House withheld comment, administration officials elsewhere indicated a belief today that William M. Jardine of Kansas, had virtually been decided on by President Coolidge for secretary of agriculture.

The Kansas delegation in congress which once endorsed J. C. Mohler, also of Kansas, for the post, met and changed its support to Mr. Jardine. Members of the committee have been in constant consultation with Mr. Coolidge, but they declined to say whether they had definite information as to his decision.

Mr. Jardine, who is a member of the president's agricultural conference conferred with Mr. Coolidge. Officials said the visit had to do with agricultural questions, but declined to go into details.

Mr. Jardine is president of the Kansas agricultural college, and his supporters say he has the endorsement of Secretary Hoover to whom the president previously had offered the position of secretary.

His attitude toward the McNary-Hausen farm bill had been disappointing to some of the Kansas delegation supporting that measure, the delegation was unanimous today however, in its endorsement of him.

Mr. Jardine has had many kinds of experience that would be of value to him as Secretary of Agriculture.

Born on an Idaho ranch in 1879, he was a cattle puncher in Montana at the age of 15, and then after a course at the Utah Agricultural college became an instructor there. In 1906, he began a four year period of service in the agriculture department here in charge of cereal problems. He has been connected with Kansas agricultural college since 1914 and its head since 1918.

Miss Teleford spent a few hours in Roseburg this morning visiting and shopping. Miss Teleford is from Happy Valley, and returned home this afternoon.

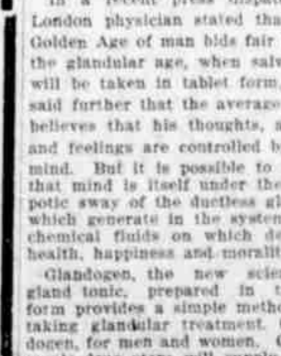
Mrs. Campbell Improving—
