While players who are candidates for other positions on the football team have been held, awaiting the arrival of the line mentor, no announcement was available as to a possible successor to Spellman.

GREEN VALLEY MAN INSTANTLY KILLED BY FALLING TREE

Martin F. Riggs, a resident of the Green Valley district, west of Oakland, was instantly killed late yesterday afternoon, when he was crushed by a falling tree. Riggs had been at Oakland, and upon his return went to a neighboring farm where men were engaged in clearing trees and brush.

Riggs was standing under another large tree, and the tree just felled tore out the top of the one under which Riggs had taken refuge. The woodcutters seeing the man's danger yelled at him, and he, either misunderstanding their calls, or becoming confused, ran directly under the falling tree, the trunk of which struck him upon the head, crushing his skull and killing him instantly.

Coroner Ritter was called and made a thorough investigation of the accident, but as the facts were evident no inquest was deemed necessary.

UPTON BILL KILLED

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Feb. 12—The senate has killed by indefinite postponement on adoption of an adverse committee report, a bill introduced by Upton, proposing to make it unlawful to practice any system or method of treating the sick or afflicted without having a state license, and prohibiting the use of the terms "doctor" or the abbreviation "Dr." without having such license.

GAS PRICE INCREASING CHICAGO, Feb. 12—Effective tomorrow the price of gasoline will be increased two cents a gallon throughout the eleven states served by the Standard Oil Company of Indiana it was announced today. Kerosene prices will advance one cent.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12—An investigation of the gasoline industry was proposed in the senate today by Senator Trammell, democrat, Florida. The resolution would have the federal trade commission examine into recent "arbitrary and unwarranted" increases in the price of gasoline, with a view to prosecutions, should a violation of law be discovered.

PROVE DAM COLLAPSE

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Feb. 12—Governor Pierce today appointed a special committee of three citizens to investigate the cause of the collapse of the Bully creek dam in Malheur county and the result of the flood that followed. Judge William Doby, member of the state highway commission; J. H. Raley, Pendleton attorney and Fred Phillips, rancher of Baker were appointed.

FLOOD CAUSED BY JAM

SCHENACTADY, N. Y., Feb. 12—An ice jam in the Mohawk river, half way between here and Cohoes, where it empties into the Hudson, has caused the water to rise 14 feet, flooding part of the southern section of this city, where the General Electric plants are located.

ONE STORM FATALITY

NAPA, California, February 12.—The first fatality of the storm in Northern California was recorded today when William Watson, a laborer, was killed in the cave-in of a cellar that was being constructed for a country home near St. Helena, north of here. An unidentified fellow worker was perhaps fatally injured. Watson's body had not been recovered several hours after the cave-in.

100 PASSENGERS MAROONED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—More than 100 passengers on two south-bound Northwestern Pacific trains from Eureka, including Dr. C. A. Schenck, chief forester of the republic of Germany, are marooned by the storm at Toland Mountain, 24 miles north of Willits, Mendocino county. The train has been held there for two days.
