BUYERS LOOKING AT ROACH TIMBER LAND EAST OF SUTHERLIN

Several well known eastern lumbermen accompanied by buyers arrived in Sutherlin today (Thursday) and after purchasing a quantity of supplies departed by automobile for the Roach Timber Company's holdings at the head of Sutherlin Valley, says the Sutherlin Sun.

It has been rumored here for several days that a deal was pending for the sale of the Roach Timber Co's holdings east of Sutherlin and that a large mill would go in on the 294-acre tract of the company two miles east of town if the deal was consummated satisfactorily to all parties. During the past week several men have been engaged in clearing the trails through the timber of uncut and dead limbs, so that passage can be readily made by the horses carrying the lumbermen and cruisers.

The Roach Timber Company has approximately 55,000 acres of the finest timber in Oregon at the head of Sutherlin Valley. Just preceding the world war the company began preparations looking to the development of this timber, and a roadbed for a standard gauge railroad was constructed for a distance of over two miles extending east from the Sutherlin Pacific railroad in Sutherlin. The death of Mr. Roach, head of the company, followed by the war, resulted in a suspension of operations. Now, it is understood, eastern lumbermen have become interested in the timber, and in all probability we can look for a resumption of development work at an early date.

R. M. Fox, Pacific Coast manager of the Roach Timber Company, was in Sutherlin Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning. He was accompanied by Mrs. Fox and they were enroute to Pasadena, California, where Mr. Fox had been called by the serious illness of his mother. When asked in regard to the outlook for timber development, Mr. Fox appeared quite optimistic in regard to the outcome of negotiations now pending between his company and the gentlemen who are now here, but stated that he was not in a position to give out any information at this time, but hoped to be able to do so on his return from California.

GLENDALE LUMBER PAYROLL FOR YEAR IS OVER \$130,000

Very few even of our own citizens realize the extent of the lumber business of this city, says the Glendale News.

During 1924, in which year most of our mills did not operate after the 1st of July there were shipped out of Glendale yards the following lumber products:

Table with 2 columns: Product, Amount. Lumber, cars 495; Tie, cars 42; Piling, cars 6; Woods, cars 11. Total cars shipped 644.

And these figures do not include the lumber and wood that was billed out at the Loyal siding by the Panther-Butte lumber company and others.

According to the manifests the average value of these products for a. b. Glendale was \$425 per car, or a total of \$235,450.

Statistics prove that about 58 per cent of the total cost of lumber for a. b. cars is for labor. Therefore \$126,000 were paid to the laboring men of this vicinity last year for about half a year's work, as most of the mills only operated the first half of the year.

The year, with the mills all running, the chances are that the payroll for the timber workers will be not less than \$25,000 a month, which is about \$1900 a day for each working day.

MRS. CURRIN DIES AT DAUGHTER'S HOME

Mrs. Lucy Currin, aged 76 years, passed away last night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Robert Gile, after a lingering illness. Mrs. Currin was born in Missouri, but spent much of her life in the state of Montana, before she and her husband came to Oregon about 20 years ago. She resided in Cottage Grove until about a year and a half ago, when she came to Roseburg and took up her residence near her daughter. Her husband, prior to his death 18 years ago, was interested in mining, and was active in the development of mining property in the Bohemia district.

Mrs. Currin leaves one son John, a resident of Seattle and two daughters, Mrs. Ernest Purvance of San Diego and Mrs. R. L. Gile of Roseburg. The body will be taken to Cottage Grove tomorrow, and the funeral services will be held there tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist church. Mrs. Currin was a lifelong member of that church, and Rev. Knotts, now of this city, was her minister for several years in Cottage Grove, will conduct the services.
