SOCIETY WOMAN IS BUSINESS SUCCESS

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—From a society woman who had never done any work as a wage earner until 12 years ago, Mrs. William Lumber has advanced to a position in the National City Bank of New York where she will have charge of all business done by the bank with women.

She went into business after her husband, a Wall street broker, was killed in an automobile accident and the responsibility of caring for her three children was thrust upon her. She began in a position little above that of a clerkship and steadily advanced to the rank of executive in the first billion dollars commercial bank in America.

RIGHT TO SEARCH AUTO UPHELD BY JUDGE HAMILTON

Judge J. W. Hamilton in sustaining the state's demurrer in the case of Otto Muetzel against Deputy Sheriffs D. R. Shambrook and J. G. Hodges.

Muetzel brought suit for \$5,000 claiming illegal detention and search, maintaining that the officers halted his automobile and made a search of his car without a search warrant.

District Attorney Guy Gordon filed a demurrer, claiming that the complaint did not constitute a cause for action in that it failed to deny the right of the officers to make a search without a warrant.

Attorney Albert Abraham, representing Muetzel, claimed that an automobile was as free from search as the person.

CREAMERY MEN ELECT OFFICERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—The North Pacific Creameries, a co-operative association incorporated under Oregon laws at a meeting here late yesterday elected 9 directors and a set of officers.

M. M. Boney of the Eugene Farmer's Creamery, was elected president, H. C. Raven, Raven Dairy company, Portland, was named vice-president and Y. D. Chappell, O. A. C., was made secretary-treasurer.

Besides the officers, those elected directors were: F. R. Coleman, St. Paul; H. M. Black, Hood River; Frank Hettwer, Mount Angel; C. F. Bates, Salem and C. W. Laughlin, Astoria.

The officers approved a contract which the eight affiliating creameries signed to make the association effective.

Wheat Wizard

LEADERS IN ITALIAN POLITICAL CRISIS

Here are four men who are prominently mentioned in the present political upheaval in Italy. Antonio Salandra, former Premier, caused a sensation by deserting Premier Benito Mussolini, following the publication of documents that alleged Mussolini knew too much of the murder of the millionaire Socialist Deputy, Matteotti. Signor Amendola is the editor of the anti-Fascist journal "Il Mondo," suppressed by Mussolini. Andrea Torre has been appointed to the Mussolini Cabinet to succeed Salandra. Signor Federzoni, Minister of the Interior in the Mussolini Cabinet, and head of the National Police, is primarily responsible for the action of the Fascist "Black Shirts," as the militia is called.

MARKETS

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—A further severe break is shown in the local egg market with all grades posted three cents lower on the exchange. Extras are now down to the 29 cent level; firsts 28 cents; pullets 26 cents and current receipts at 24 cents. Receipts continue liberal with a narrower shipping outlet owing to other markets declining.

Butter is in a firm position with the supply barely sufficient for the requirements. Off grade butter is cheaper and more plentiful than high score stocks.

Actual sales at the 18-cent level and options taken at 20 cents by foreign buyers are the latest developments in the Pacific coast pork market. For some time the market has been slowly accumulating strength but holders and buyers alike not getting together on a price that would allow shipment east.

During the last few days the movement from the coast has been heavy. While no actual advance in prices is indicated on the sales, 14 cents has been paid for old hams and 17 cents for stocks that were little better than mediums.

In the south it is reported that Sonoma brought 15 cents with more offers made at that level without being filled.

Recent sales in the valley include the Jess Seavey lot of 507 bales at Corvallis for 17 cents and the McPherson crop at Sherwood. European buyers have taken options on two lots in the valley at 20 cents. This is significant to the face of the dwindling supply. Later checks indicate around 6500 bales left in this state. The entire stock remaining on the coast is now thought to be less than 20,000 bales.

CHARGE HOOVER IS TOO DOMINEERING

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The charge that Secretary Hoover is "seeking to dominate the agriculture of America," was made before the house agricultural committee today by Charles E. Hearst, of Iowa, chairman of the legislative committee of the American farm bureau federation.

In explanation of the assertion, the witness produced a magazine article in which he said the secretary claimed authorship of suggestions contained in the pending Capper-Williams farm relief legislation.

While Mr. Hearst was testifying this afternoon, the senate committee continued examination into suggestions of President Coolidge's agricultural conference with Chairman Carey of the conference as a witness.

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with a warrant as any other property of a person, but Judge Hamilton held that under the statutes an officer has a right and a duty to search a car suspected of carrying liquor.

Attorney Abraham questioned the constitutionality of the law, but Judge Hamilton stated that he had thoroughly investigated the law and that he would hold it constitutional until the supreme court reversed such a decision.

Ten days was given to file an amended complaint.

Heroine of Nome Epidemic

MISS EMILY MORGAN

The outstanding heroine of the Nome, Alaska, diphtheria epidemic has been Miss Emily Morgan, of Wichita, Kansas, the only Red Cross nurse in that vicinity. Day and night she has been with her patients in the wards of the Maynard-Columbia Hospital, helping to keep down the death toll, while out in the bleak wastes, at 50 below zero, hardy mushers were cracking their whips over jaded dogs to rush in, in record breaking time, 300,000 units of antitoxin that were sent out to check the epidemic. From her hospital, she went also to the huts of the natives and the igloos of the Eskimos, facing death daily in her mission of mercy.
