UMPQUA HARBOR BILL PRESENTED

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—An amendment to the rivers and harbors bill providing for preliminary survey of Umpqua river and harbor with a view to their improvement was adopted by the senate committee on commerce today. At the same time the committee gave its approval to the McNary amendment giving local interests on Tillamook bay credit for \$255,000 already expended by them on harbor improvement.

If the latter amendment is accepted by the house local interests on Tillamook bay will not have to share any part of the cost of new work recommended by the board of army engineers. The reading of the bill was not completed.

VICTIM REMAINS IN DEATH TRAP

rescue.

At noon dirt and stone was being hoisted out indicating that the mouth of the new tunnel was being widened and braced for the exploring party.

CAVE CITY, Ky., Feb. 13.—A tunnel which the rescuers hope may lead to the cavern behind Floyd Collins was discovered on the left or northwest side of the Sand Cave resort early today. Timbering was rushed on the fifth section and preparations made to drive piling into the side wall, around and above the tunnel hole, so a rescue party could enter it with safety.

The hole was unmistakably a passageway leading down into a limestone cave and miners brought up pieces of cavernous rock to exhibit to H. T. Carmichael. The medical staff and other officials were hurriedly awakened.

While the miners felt that it might be several hours before a rescue party would be permitted to explore the tunnel, there was already keen competition among the diggers for the honor of going down on the next shift. The down draft in the shaft was so strong that the miner's lamps were blown out when they looked down the near tunnel.

The hole was first discovered about 1:30 a. m. and Carmichael, in charge of the shaft and a doctor were awakened, meanwhile, the diggers had uncovered a hole which seemed two or three feet high extending downward at a rather sharp slope. Their lamps were blown out by the down draft when they looked down the hole. The bottom of the shaft was hurriedly cleared for the sixteenth section of timbering so short piling could be driven in the sidewall parallel to the new tunnel.

The discovery of the new tunnel was closely guarded, the miners refusing to talk about it. But looking down the mouth of the shaft, the shadow of the hole was clearly evident. The down draft had cleared out the shaft of the thin for which has filled the shaft since the cold snap, caused by the miners breathing and the warmth of their bodies and the hole in the flickering light of the miners' lamps, appeared to extend nearly half way across one side of the six foot square shaft.

The hole was found in the side wall at about the 50 foot mark, measuring from the low side, or 55 feet measuring from the high side of the shaft away from the mouth of Sand Cave. In the original exploration of the diamond drill, a few feet from the shaft a soft spot was indicated at 51 feet, and another such soft spot was shown last night followed by at least 10 feet of limestone. The drill was boring further into this, early this morning, when the top of the new tunnel was uncovered. Drilling was at once stopped, to concentrate on clearing out this tunnel.

The engineering staff made immediate preparations to timber around and down into the new tunnel, and finish the sixteenth section of shaft timbering only sufficiently to prevent serious cave-ins on the wall opposite the new tunnel.

Carmichael explored the mouth of the new tunnel at daybreak and said he hoped they would have Collins out by noon.

The new tunnel as the mouth of it was further cleared away, was easily large enough to accommodate a good sized miner and as far as they could peer down into it, ran straight away from the northwest corner of the shaft, diagonally to the left toward the mouth of Sand Cave.

The tunnel was discovered just underneath a thick limestone ledge, giving the officials hope that the new tunnel was part of the same honeycomb working in which Collins is trapped.

From his preliminary exploration of the new tunnel, Carmichael indicated he believed the tunnel would lead down to a huge pit located just behind Collins. Finding this they could roll the rock off Collins' leg and release him.

The high hopes of the diggers and engineers shone in their faces when the mouth of the tunnel was completely exposed and the miners confidently predicted they would have "Collins out by noon."

The use of rope slings around the diggers, previously arranged for when the hoped for tunnel was disclosed, was found unnecessary, since the tunnel appeared in the side wall of the shaft underneath a heavy limestone ledge. The workmen at the bottom of the shaft are on a 100 foot ledge of limestone, so they are in no danger of breaking through into a cavern. When the first exploring party enters the tunnel, the men probably will have ropes around their waists, so they may be held safely, if the new tunnel drops over a cliff.

The original Sand Cave tunnel drops over a ten foot cliff, a few feet inside the mouth. Preliminary exploration of the new found tunnel was the determination of the fresh shaft which went down in the shaft at nine o'clock, one slender determined digger vowing that "orders or no orders," he proposed to explore that tunnel a ways.

Carmichael this morning admitted, conservatively that a lead has been found with a strong down draft of air, "which we hope will lead to something."

ACTRESS SUING WEALTHY BACHELOR

OFFICERS FIND STILL AND MASH IN OAKLAND STORE

W. E. Krouzer, a groceryman at Oakland, was arrested last night charged with operating a still, and will be turned over to the government. Officers found a still, two gallons of moonshine, and 100 gallons of mash.

A federal agent, according to Sheriff Starmer, purchased a gallon jug of moonshine from Krouzer for \$20, this liquor being held as evidence in the case. Upon this information a search warrant was secured and Mr. Krouzer's place raided last night.

Deputy Sheriffs Shambrook, Leas and Hodges, together with a federal operative, searched the premises and found a still improvised from a five-gallon kerosene can and a copper coil. The still showed evidence of having been used previously, and from the corroded condition of the tin kettle used, the moonshine produced must have been of a decidedly injurious nature.

Officers found a roll of new copper tubing and other indications pointing to the fact that another still of like nature was planned. There were 100 gallons of corn mash confiscated, together with a quantity of sugar and other supplies.

As the case was plainly one of manufacture, according to Sheriff Starmer, it was turned over to the government, and a complaint was sworn to before U. S. Commissioner Hopkins.
