NEW ENGLAND IS DAMAGED BY FLOOD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BOSTON, Feb. 14.—Three deaths, the destruction of bridges and dams and the disruption of rail, telephone, telegraph and highway communication in various sections were listed today among the results of the flood and ice jams that have occurred throughout New England during the last two days.

Pete Silver lost his life, while helping to strengthen a railroad bridge in New Hampshire. Carl Hooper, a lumberman, was drowned while trying to prevent logs from being carried away in Maine, and Allen Leving, 9 years old, was drowned in a brook at Stoneham, Mass.

AID OFFERED THE ORCHARDISTS IN SEND- ING FRUIT TO EUROPE.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BERLIN, Feb. 13.—When the apple growers of northern New York or of the far northwest want to know when, where, and in how great quantities it is advisable to ship their product to Germany, they will hereafter be able to obtain accurate advice from the department of agriculture at Washington, or from its Berlin office at 4 Pariser Platz.

They will thereby avoid the situation that obtained with reference to the 1924 crop. Relying upon the advice of European brokers, the apple growers shipped large quantities of apples to Germany in September and October. These shipments arrived about the time that apples from Czechoslovakia, Austria, and France poured in, and German apples still further helped to glut the market. The result was a loss to apple growers all around.

This concentration of shipments in late autumn has meant also that in March and April Germany will have practically no apples. The European varieties won't keep so long, it seems, and no provision has been made for American apples to be shipped. Apparently nobody has ever made it his business to supply the American apple growers with authentic information, and the department of agri-

culture's foreign service proposes to remedy this defect. With this in view, an expert on apples is making a careful survey of European apple growing. He is visiting the apple centers and is organizing an information service by which American growers will next year know exactly how good and ample the European crop is, when and where it is being moved, and at what time and in what quantities American growers can hope best to dispose of their export product.

ROUNDUP OF TAXI DRIVERS STARTED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Fifty-five taxi drivers were arrested and 1,500 served with summons in a police round-up of criminals operating taxicabs without license.

Thirty-five were arraigned in night court. Nine were sentenced to the workhouse for operating without license. Fines of \$25 to \$50 were imposed against the others.

All available men on the force were pressed into service to inspect the 17,000 cabs in the city. Many drivers learned of the round up in time to evade the police net. Some drivers abandoned their cars in the streets. Others hurriedly drove their cabs to garages.

VICTIMS OF MINE DISASTER TOTAL 121

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DORTMUND, Germany, Feb. 14.—Burial of the victims of the Stein mine explosion here Wednesday night has been arranged for next Tuesday.

Government members church dignitaries and representatives of the miners' federation and mine operators will participate in the service.

The official count of the bodies brought from the mine is given as 121, with 14 men unaccounted for and assumed to be dead.

Heat-rendering scenes continue to be enacted before the building to which the bodies were brought as only male relatives were permitted to identify the victims, women and children being barred until the corpses are encased in coffins.

ELIHU ROOT EULOGIZED BY HUGHES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Elihu Root, at a dinner tendered him last night by the Union League Club of New York of which he has twice been president, has declared that in retiring from public life, he had faith that the United States will prosper and progress under its present democratic form of government. The dinner was in celebration of Mr. Root's 80th birthday anniversary which will be Sunday.

Mr. Root's career was eulogized by Charles Evans Hughes, secretary of state and James M. Beck, solicitor general of the United States.

Overwhelmed by the ovation, Mr. Root could at first say only: "I have done what came to my hand to do as well as I could."

Mr. Root affirmed his devotion to the United States government as it is today and said that the American people are more competent now to carry out their duties as citizens than they were when he first launched upon a public career.

One Wife on Approval by VIOLET DARE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—Federal agents today investigated reports that William Dudley (Big Bill) Haywood, who fled to Russia in 1919 after he and 92 others were given penitentiary sentences for obstructing the government in prosecuting the war, had returned to settle his affairs preparatory to giving himself up.

Officials of the I. W. W. here denied knowledge of his presence as also did William Broas Lloyd, wealthy communist who paid the government the \$30,000 bonds he had provided for Haywood. The I. W. W. headquarters said it would not be surprised if Haywood should appear before long. Haywood was reported to have left Russia where he had been an agent for the Soviet government a month ago. A sentence of 20 years in the Leavenworth Federal penitentiary and a \$10,000 fine were given Haywood by Judge K. M. Landis in 1918. He was sent to the prison but released in 1919 on bonds provided by Lloyd pending an appeal. The sentence was upheld, but meanwhile Haywood had fled to Russia.
