### PAGAN DANCING HALTED IN CHURCH

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—The withdrawal of dancing as a part of the expressionistic religious programme of St. Mark's on the Bowery was announced at yesterday's vesper services of the church by Dr. William Norman Guthrie, rector. Consideration for "our fellow churchmen who cannot see their way to trust us with this great and holy instrument of religious education," was given by Dr. Guthrie as the principal reason for eliminating the ceremonies.

The introduction of "pagan rites" and expressionistic dances into the services of St. Mark's caused an open break between the rector and Bishop William T. Manning of the Episcopal Diocese about a year ago. A service combining the ritual of Anglicans, occidental Catholics and Eastern Catholics, was held in the morning at St. Mark's. Dr. Guthrie said it was the first of the kind in church history. He described the service as a rhythmic structural oratorio embodying all the colors of the rainbow and the Aurora Borealis; and the sounds to be expected from a male choir singing against an organ equipped with a tom-tom and castanets; and screen verses of nearly all the symbolic personages in mythology, except cupid and the missing link.

### SEATTLE ACCIDENT TOLL SUNDAY GREAT

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 16.—One person was killed and 12 others injured, four seriously in automobile accidents in or near Seattle yesterday.

Mrs. Bernice Wooley, 25, was killed and William Lee, 21, was critically injured when the automobile in which they were riding collided with another driven by E. A. Hooper on the Bothell highway. Hooper was badly injured, as was also Miss Esther Rice, 18, who was riding with him. Three other occupants of Hooper's car escaped with bruises and lacerations. Both cars were wrecked. While they were in the road with the victims planned under them and when a score of automobiles had lined up to offer help a big roadster sped through the traffic jam and knocked three automobiles into the ditch. Three men received slight injuries in these crashes.

Deputy sheriffs after a wild five mile chase arrested J. S. McFeeley, as the driver of the car which had plunged through the traffic jam.

John Sullivan 44, was struck by automobile on a downtown street. He is lying unconscious in the city hospital with a fractured skull.

### SOUTH SEA ISLANDS MAY BE SITE FOR WORLD PEACE CITY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
HONOLULU, Feb. 15.—The Palmyra Islands, some 1900 miles south of Hawaii will be devoted to the Pan-Pacific union as a gift if the United States agrees to withdraw sovereignty from them and recognize the islands as a neutral inviolate place of refuge for all persons who wish to confer on matters looking to the advancement of all interests common to the Pacific people, according to an announcement made by the owner L. Fullard-Leo at a Pan-Pacific luncheon.

Alexander Hume Ford, director of the Pan-Pacific union, said that the offer will be taken under advisement by the union, and its decision as to acceptance will be reserved until the attitude of the state department at Washington is learned.

The islands were purchased outright several years ago from Judge Henry E. Cooper by Fullard-Leo, who was born in South Africa, but now is an American citizen. It has been his idea to provide some one recognized spot in the Pacific, under the flag of no nation but under the protection of all, where in peace or war persons might meet in perfect freedom to discuss any matters of import to the Pacific people.

"It opens up a tremendous question that will have to be decided by the Pacific powers," said an announcement from the union. "Will they permit such an independent island in the Pacific?"

"For a quarter of a century there has been a movement on foot in Europe to create a world city, where a permanent parliament of the world would be held. Extensive plans of the world city have been sent to the union from Rome, with the statement that in the center of the Pacific alone would such a world capital be safe."

"The tentative offer of an independent principality to the Pan-Pacific union, to be under the control of no nation but its perpetual peace assured by the countries bordering the Pacific, will doubtless cause world-wide comment, and possibly a line of international reasoning that may lead to the approval of the Fullard-Leo plan."

"It may be stated in passing that Palmyra is a part of Hawaii, a ward, in fact of the city of Honolulu. Any persons living in Palmyra may vote for officials of the city and county of Honolulu. The city council has been authorized, but if the world were the gainer, she can afford to give her assistance."
