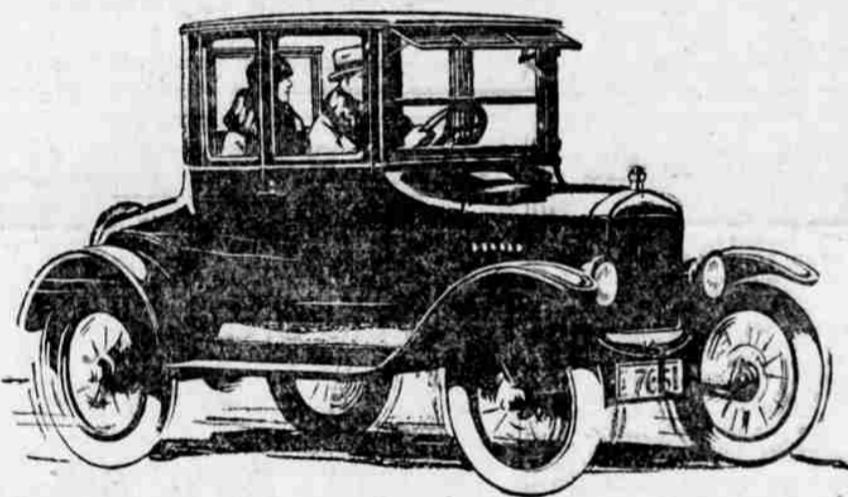

WANT REPORT ON 1923 BOMB TESTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The house aircraft committee, adopted a resolution today asking Secretary Weeks for a confidential report on the 1923 bombing tests against the battleship New Jersey and Virginia.

This action was taken after Representative La Guardia, republican, New York, testified that the war secretary in a letter of February 7, 1925, had refused him the information due to its confidential nature.

The secretary's letter read by Mr. La Guardia said the material could be furnished to a congressional committee only.

Representative Vestal of Indiana, the republican whip, has placed before the committee a resolution to authorize continuation

of the investigation after adjournment of congress, March 4.

THREE BUILDINGS WRECKED BY BOMBS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PITTSBURGH, Feb. 18.—Three buildings in the Penn Avenue wholesale produce district of Pittsburgh were demolished by a series of explosions early today, with a score of other buildings in a score of other buildings were shattered. Many residents of the region were thrown from their beds by the force of the blast. They escaped with minor injuries. After an investigation Fire Marshal Thomas Marr reported he believed the first explosion was a dynamite bomb, set off in one of the buildings. This blast, he said, was followed by gas explosions.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—An economy contest with a \$10 prize award, one of the results of President Coolidge's economy program, closed today at the White House executive offices.
Mr. Coolidge, holding that economy should begin at home, recently inquired of Director Lord of the Budget Bureau as to how much of a saving should be made in the next year in the expense of the executive office. Director Lord is understood to have advised the president that it ought to be possible to lop off \$12,500.
Mr. Coolidge passed the word along to the office force and N. E. Webster, White House disbursing clerk issued the following notice to employees:
"As the official responsible in this matter, I shall be glad to award a prize of ten dollars from personal funds to the employee who submits the best suggestions for bringing about a reduction of expenditures. These suggestions should be along practical lines and should not be radical in their nature and not tend to disorganize the work of the office. Please send in your summary before February 18."

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—Butter is two cents higher today with local creameries quoting 47 cents, print basis. Bids for butter fat were boosted two cents. Luceo butter makers are now quoting a buying price of 37 cents a pound delivered Portland.
The advance here was forced by the action of Puget Sound interests who put their market up a cent a week ago followed by another boost of two cents yesterday.
The local market has been showing a good healthy tone for the past two weeks with the market about sufficient for requirements. Portland butter makers were content with a good active market but were compelled to go up to protect competitive cream territory.
Storage stocks have gradually moved out at current levels and it is expected that the big surplus over a year ago will be absorbed.

On the dairy exchange the market was firm with standard cubes posted a half cent higher at 44 cents, placing extras and standards on the same level.

Cube firings advanced a cent to 39 cents. Other grades were unchanged.

Egg prices range from a 1 to 2 cents higher today with extras and firsts posted 1 cent higher at 31 and 30c respectively; pullets advanced two cents to 29 cents and current receipts were bid a half higher at 26 1/2c.

Choices light calves are now firmly established at the 17 cent level in the local country dressed meat market. Receipts are light and fancy stuff is in demand. Ordinary good calves are selling around 16 to 16 1/2 cents; heifer receipts are also moderate but few of the butchers will pay over 15c for choice light pork.

Poultry receipts are only moderate but apparently sufficient for all requirements at the present time. Demand is barely normal and prices generally unchanged. Demand is good for fancy dressed turkeys with few coming in.

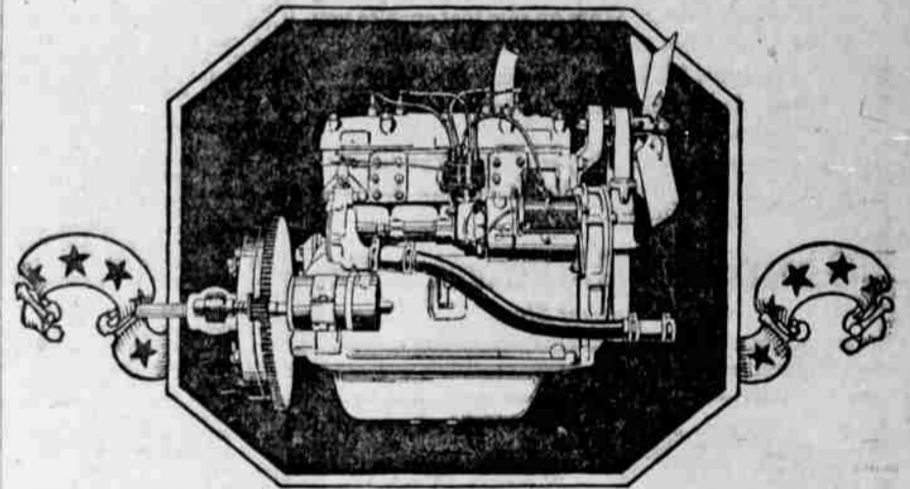
