**NEW RADIO SYSTEM IS BEING PLANNED**

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—An eventful linking into a permanent hook-up by telephone and stations in 18 cities for simultaneous radio broadcasting of programs furnished by station WEAJ, New York, is contained in a plan for a super-system of radio broadcasting announced by the American Telephone and Telegraph company. The new project provides that the connection be available every night from 8 to 11.

Long distance telephone lines will be used for the transmission of the programs, John A. Holman, radio-casting manager of the telephone company said yesterday.

"When this program is completed," he said, "a speaker can project his personality in one breath to the freeways and into the hearts of 12,500,000 people."

He added that the radio fans are turning from jazz to better music as the most popular feature of radio programs.

The stations now under contract to participate in the new project, he said, include WCAP, Washington; WJAR, Providence; WEEI,

Boston; WDBH, Worcester, Mass.; WFL and WOOD, Philadelphia; WCAE, Pittsburgh; WGR, Buffalo; WWJ, Detroit; WCCO, Minneapolis; WOOC, Davenport, Ia.; WTIC, Hartford; and WEAR, Cleveland.

**SUIT AGAINST JAZZ PLAYER WITHDRAWN**

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 18.—United Press.—Professor Francis Woodward, vocal teacher and choir leader, has abandoned his attempt to make the classics safe from jazz in this modern musical era.

Professor Woodward sometime ago filed suit against Ralph Pollock, conductor of a dance orchestra, whom he charged with synecopating the works of master composers. His grounds for the action were that jazzing the classics gave the public an erroneous idea of their composition and discouraged people from giving their children musical training.

"But the public got an entirely wrong impression of what I am trying to do," Woodward said, "so I am withdrawing the suit and hope one of these days to accomplish the thing by less drastic methods. Public sentiment can be educated to a point where some people could cheerfully hit a jazz player on the nose if he became too familiar with the beautiful work done by the masters."

Woodward and his friends believe jazzing of famous pieces so that they can be jazzed should arouse people to the same frenzy as that evoked by a cartoonist putting a moustache on the Mona Lisa or a sign painter daubing an advertisement on the fore ground of a Turner seascape.

**AMERICAN FILMS VOTED BEST PRODUCED ANYWHERE**

BERLIN, Feb. 18.—(A. P.)—American films made the strongest impression throughout the world during the year 1924, in the opinion of men and women regarded as authorities on the question of the film of Der Deutsche, a local daily.

This journal addressed an inquiry to ministers of education, movie stars, stage managers, critics, movie playwrights, editors of film magazines, and movie censors in a number of foreign countries, asking them which of the 1924 films impressed them most.

Ranked according to the countries of their origin, the verdict was as follows: "The first place" was awarded to 174 American, 124 German, 25 French, 27 Swedish, 14 Russian, and 4 Italian films.

American or English films referred to by title and recurring frequently as favorites include "Down to the Sea in Ships" and "Broken Blossoms" and "The Thief of Bagdad."

Mary Pickford and Alla Nazimova both voted first place to "The Salvation Hunters." Charlie Chaplin agreed with Conan Doyle in believing "Down to the Sea in Ships" to have been the strongest movie of the year.

**BROADWAY CLEANUP IS GAINING IMPETUS**

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—With the list of plays under fire increased, the movement to clean up Broadway gained impetus today. Tomorrow a group of actors will hold a protest meeting against obscene plays, and Friday a conference will bring together actors, managers and reform organizations, who are backing the clean play movement.

Each of these will be investigated after which it will be decided what action will be taken. The revival of the play jury of citizens to decide the fate of productions on which complaints have been made will be discussed at the meeting Friday.

**REORGANIZE ARMOUR AND CO., PACKERS**

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—In a deal representing approximately \$8,000,000, bankers who are talking over the bulk of the personal holdings of J. Ogden Armour in the financial reorganization of Armour & Company, packers, have agreed to purchase the Morris family stock holdings in Armour & Company.

Two years ago when Morris & Company was sold to Armour & Company, the Morris family took in part payment approximately 450,000 shares of class A common stock of Armour & Company, this stock came from Mr. Armour's holding and left him with about 975,000 shares.

The banking group took a five year option on Mr. Armour's class A stock and also on about 1,400,000 shares of class B stock. They announced last week that part of the option had been exercised and that approximately 1,000,000 shares of each issue would be offered for public subscription today, at \$23 for class A and \$14 for class B.

It was understood Mr. Armour eventually would receive around \$20,000,000 from his common stock in both classes under the terms of the bankers' proposition. This would enable the liquidation of remaining bank loans and still leave him a fortune estimated at between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000, it was said.

**OPERA OF FUTURE TO BE IN JAZZ**

BERLIN, Feb. 18.—The opera of the future will undoubtedly be a jazz band opera, writes Frank Warschauer, German theatrical critic, in Die Weltbuehne, (the world stage), after seeing an American musical comedy performed at the Neues Theater Am Zoo.

**SPORT SHORTS**

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—At the Knickerbocker rink, Willie Ritola will attempt to break the two mile record held by his countryman Paavo Nurmi. Nurmi read the distance Saturday night in eight minutes, 58.15 seconds faster than any other human ever traveled. He will appear in New York earlier in a three mile test.

Jole Ray will run in the St. Anthony 1,000 for which distance he holds the record of 2:13 25 jointly with Hal Cutbill.

Willie Plant, American walking champion who has defeated the Olympic 10,000 meter champion Hugo Frigero, on three occasions, will seek to eliminate George Goulding's two mile record of 13 minutes, 38.5 seconds.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Feb. 18.—With the arrival of Walter Johnson, hero of the last world series, here today, Manager "Bucky" Harris of the world champion Senators said that he expected the veteran twirler to affix his signature to a 1925 contract. Johnson has not yet signed a contract for 1925 but Harris confidently predicted that he would on his arrival.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Within the next few days it is believed the New York state athletic commission will seek a show down in the heavyweight boxing situation.

For the second time Harry Wills, negro heavyweight, who has been pursuing the champion, Jack Dempsey, has deposited a check for \$2500 with the commission to bind his challenge.

The first time the matter was left high in the air, but within the past year the boxing body has changed its tactics having named one champion and arranged a tournament from which will come another.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Wayne (Big) Munn, worlds heavyweight wrestling champion, will meet Mike Romano in a finish match here tonight.

Although outwatched by 60 pounds, Romano relies on some dangerous holds, including a headlock with which he once pinned Lewis. The match is Munn's second since he defeated Ed "Strangler" Lewis of Kansas City.
