### PARKING LAWS TO BE RIGIDLY ENFORCED BY THE CITY POLICE

Mayor Houck yesterday called a conference of all of the police officers of the city at which time he discussed with them their duties and rights and what is expected of them. He instructed the officers especially to pay more attention to violation of the traffic laws, particularly pertaining to over-time parking in the business district and in the vicinity of the Deer Creek bridge. The officers have been more or less lenient during the winter weather, but with the coming of spring and summer and an increased congestion of traffic, it is deemed necessary that the parking laws be enforced, in order that there may be no little congestion as possible during the tourist season. Traffic Officer Weacott states that the instructions of the mayor will be followed to the letter and that he expects to arrest owners of cars who leave their machines parked over the time limit and that a more warning will not be given as often times in the past. The parking limit of 30 minutes applies to Jackson, Cass and Sheridan streets, and on each side of the Deer Creek bridge, except during the evening and night hours after 6 p. m., when there are no restrictions. Angle parking is not permitted at any place in the city and double parking is also prohibited.

### EARLY BROCCOLI NOW ON MARKET

Crates of broccoli are already coming in, although the bulk of the crop is not expected until the first of March. These early heads appear to be of good quality, and show little injury from the December cold spell.

The warm weather of the past few days is hastening maturity, and the crop is expected to come on earlier than usual, unless retarded by cold weather between now and the first of March.

Dealers and others who have made inspections of the broccoli fields, state that it is impossible at this time to ascertain accurately the extent of damage occasioned by the cold weather, but it is doubtful if more than 100 cartloads are shipped out of the county.

The broccoli now coming in is being absorbed by the local market, but it is expected that within a few days express shipments will start.

#### CALIFORNIA OIL PRODUCTION DROPS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18. — The production of oil in California during the last year was 2,390,945,000 barrels, 22,682,895 barrels less than in the previous year, according to a statement issued by the state mining bureau.

The heaviest decline was in the southern California fields. This was partly offset by increases in the San Joaquin Valley and elsewhere, both from new wells and from wells which had been shut down or curtailed in 1923 owing to the temporary overproduction.

### RESERVE OFFICERS OF THIS CITY FOR BETTER AIR CRAFT

The Umpqua Chapter, Reserve Officers' Association of the U. S., held their monthly meeting with a dinner at the Umpqua Hotel on Monday evening. Among the officers present were Captains L. A. Dillard, Glenn Riddle, W. L. H. Osborne, and Lieutenants Leo DeBorne, Clair Allen, O. M. Barrie, M. C. Bowler, Z. V. Conwell, H. C. Church, J. A. Denn, M. E. Cooper, Harley Watson, Huron Clough, Guy Coridon and Albert Everts.

A course of military instruction was inaugurated, which is to be carried on under the supervision of the 8th division headquarters in Portland.
